Taft's Fight Is Your Fight

President Taft is leading the republican party in a gallant fight to save the protective system to the country and to maintain popular representative government under the constitution.

President Taft's fight is the fight of every republican. Under the banner of the republican party this country has prospered for over fifty years, save only during the four years when the democrats were in control of the government. It would mean the ruination of business to suddenly change from the protective system to the free trade laws which the democrats, in accordance with the declaration of their platform, would promptly enact. With manufactured articles and cereals upon the free list, as proposed in the tariff bills passed by the democratic house and courageously vetoed by President Taft, many factories would be closed. Not only would there be an army of idle workmen, thus destroying the home market for the farmer, but the latter would also be forced to contend with the influx of foreign grain admitted duty free. Manufacturers would suffer, but the greatest injury would fall upon the farmer, who has not always the capital to tide over hard times.

The fight which President Taft is making is more than a fight for the republican party. It concerns every American citizen, without regard to his political affiliation. Upon the outcome of the contest depends the preservation of our institutions and of national prosperity.

More Feeble Noises

According to a feeble local report, the interests are spending money like water to elect the republican candidates to the United States senate. From personal experiences we know that the interests thus far have failed to send their moneyed representatives into Nevada, and for fear that he might call while we are not in we will respectfully request that he shove a handsome contribution under our office door.

Canards of various kinds are now being placed in circulation by the democratic press of Nevada in a last hope of securing victory for their national candidates. The feeble utterings, however, are without result, and in every instance are serving as a boomerang. Recently the maddening press of the democracy have given wide publicity to a fake story that Senator Massey and Congressman Roberts had split up after a heated quarrel. The report originated at the democratic headquarters and was without a particle of truth as is witnessed by the fact that the two candidates continue to travel together.

The End of a Falsehood

Governor Hadley of Missouri, who had charge of Roosevelt's 72 contests upon the floor of the republican national convention—after Roosevelt had abandoned 164 contests which were admittedly without the slightest shadow of a foundation—is squarely supporting President Taft. He says that the republican party has done nothing to mar its splendid record of decency and honesty.

Governor Deneen of Illinois, who materially aided Roosevelt's cause in the pre-convention campaign and who prepared a resolution at the Chicago convention in the interest of the Roosevelt claimants, is also openly supporting President Taft. He declares that Roosevelt confessed to him that there were only 34 delegates whose cases had possible merit and that even regarding these honest men might have a difference of opinion. Colonel Roosevelt, with characteristic vituperation, denounces Governor Deneen as a falsifier and a crook. The people of Illinois know whom to believe.

The testimony and attitude of these men, former supporters of the now bolting third party and third term candidate, will put a quietus upon the false and malicious accusations of Colonel Roosevelt concerning so-called stolen delegates. There never was any foundation for the charge, but gradually and surely the truth is becoming known.

GOLDFIELD GREAT REGISTER HAS TOTAL OF 1863 NAMES

Judge Barnes closed the registration books last evening at 8 o'clock according to law, with 1863 names on the great register of Goldfield, says the Tribune. Several transfers, however, have been made and these will have to be deducted before the final figures will be found.

The registration books closed at the same time all over the county and registration officers of outside precincts under the law must send their totals to the county clerk. Some times they have not done this heretofore, but this year it will be insisted upon. With Columbia the total registration for Goldfield can be figured at close to 2000 with probably a few more, and for the county close to 2400.

FUNDS NEEDED BY REPUBLICANS FOR CAMPAIGN

CHAIRMAN OF FINANCE COMMITTEE AT RENO ISSUES APPEAL FOR DONATIONS

R. C. Turrittin, chairman of the finance committee of the republican state central committee at Reno has authorized an appeal for contributions to the campaign fund, and especially he solicits small contributions from individuals.

"The state central committee," said Mr. Turrittin, "has conducted the present campaign upon moneys received from friends of the candidates and from loyal party members who are anxious to see the republican policy of protection to Nevada industries maintained. The committee has not sufficient money to accomplish the legitimate, necessary purposes of the campaign, and we must call upon the party at large to aid us.

"The committee does not desire a dollar more than is necessary to meet actual expenses. The committee believes, in common with the great leader of our party, that clean politics can be accomplished only by adhering strictly to the law governing campaign contributions. In Nevada, at least, the democrats have all the funds and they are spending them with lavish hands. This may have some effect but we doubt it, as the Nevada voter is far too discerning a person to be influenced in that manner.

"United States Senator W. A. Massey will be elected by a handsome vote November 5, but we will not let up on the fight in his behalf for a single instant. Nevada must send Massey back to the senate, there to safeguard the wool, the cattle, the agricultural and the mining industries of this state. If Massey is not on hand to watch and to carry on the battle for this state, wool growers of Nevada may expect tremendous loss if not absolute ruin in an industry that today, under the republican principle of protection, brings into the state more than \$5,000,000 annually. Therefore, every person interested in the present and future welfare of this state will do his share to elect Massey. It is also necessary to keep Congressman Roberts at Washington, for he is thoroughly acquainted with our needs, and he, like Massey, is ever ready to protect the state.

"There is one certain way of manifesting your interest, aside from going to the polls and voting for Massey and Roberts and inducing your friends to do likewise. That way is to contribute your mite to the campaign fund. We need every dollar that can be obtained. No sum is too small to merit a grateful acknowledgment.

"Remember, it will be a sorry day for the development of this state if we refuse to continue in force, so far as is in our power, those measures which have done so much for Nevada and which promise such a prosperous, progressive future for a state which is proving her richness in minerals, in sheep, in cattle and in agriculture, proving it to the extent of millions of dollars annually."
