

BUILDING DYNAMITED

Thirteen People Narrowly Escape From Death

DYNAMITE PLACED IN SACK AND TIED TO DOOR KNOB DESTROYS PORTION OF MANHATTAN HOUSE

MANHATTAN, Nev., Oct. 25.—The two-story business block owned by S. P. Santos, located on central Main street, was dynamited at 1:20 this morning and part of the front torn out.

A. M. Boyle, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stimler, Miss Theresa Conroy, Chas. Blaylock and four Slavonians whose names have not been learned, occupied rooms upstairs. The noise of the explosion awakened all of them, and was heard over half the town.

At the time of the explosion Santos and his wife were asleep in a room back of the millinery store, Attorney C. O. Burkert, Sam Devine,

Santos, who is the constable of Manhattan township, is at a loss as to who committed the act, or what motive prompted it. The citizens of the camp are greatly incensed over the explosion and, judging from expressions heard on the streets, if the guilty party is apprehended it will go hard with him.

EXPERT NOW EXAMINING BOOKS COUNTY OFFICES

MAJOR MONTEATH ENGAGED IN ANNUAL INSPECTION OF COUNTY ACCOUNTS

The experting of the affairs of the county offices is an annual occurrence and Major Monteath was appointed to make the inspection, at the regular meeting held last July. He has been working for the past several days and expects to complete his labors in about a week or ten days. The report will be submitted to the board of commissioners.

TWO OFFICERS OF DIAZ STAFF ARE EXECUTED

PUBLIC OPINION FAVORS DEATH OF DIAZ AND DEATH SENTENCE IS IMMINENT

VERA CRUZ, Oct. 25.—Majors Zarato and Cuesta, two of the captured officers of the staff of General Felix Diaz, were shot by the federal troops last night, after being sentenced to death by a summary court martial. The execution was secret. Public opinion against Diaz is so strong that it is thought the death sentence will be pronounced on him, as well as all officers and government officials who joined in his cause. The troops probably will not be punished.

OFFICER SHOT IN BATTLE WITH STRIKE PICKETS

DEPUTY SHERIFF RECEIVES FATAL WOUND WHILE ESCORTING MINERS TO WORK

BINGHAM, Ut., Oct. 25.—Deputy Sheriff Tidwell was shot in the breast probably fatally and Fred Harmon, a tram foreman, was shot in the right arm, in a fight between officers and Creton strike pickets, marking the resumption of operations of the United States mine and tramway. Two Greeks were also shot, one seriously. Miners were being taken to work by Tidwell when the firing started. When Tidwell fell, 16 guards opened fire on the Cretons, who fled to the hills after firing several volleys.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 25.—George Burnham, for many years head of the Baldwin Locomotive works, is critically ill at his home here. He is 96 years old and retired from business five years ago.

W. J. STOCK IS APPOINTED BY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TO OFFICE OF AUDITOR-RECORDER

Winton J. Stock of the firm of Cuddy & Stock, was today appointed county auditor and recorder by the commissioners. The appointment was made to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Puddy Grimes, former auditor and recorder.

In view of the terms of Stock's application the commissioners could do nothing but give him the appointment. As soon as the announcement was made Stock was instructed to secure the necessary bond and file the same with the county clerk this afternoon when the oath of office would be administered. Stock secured the bond, and after legally qualifying, assumed the oath of office and took charge of the recorder's office.

But two applications were presented to the board when the session was held this morning, that of Stock, and one from Charles E. Coble. Several verbal applications had been made but they were not considered. The application of Mr. Stock read as follows: "Tonopah, Nev., Oct. 24, 1912. To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners of Nye County, Nevada: "I, the undersigned, do hereby make application for the office of auditor and recorder, for the unexpired term, caused by the lamented death of the late Puddy Grimes, incumbent.

Stock is one of the pioneer merchants of Tonopah and this is the first time he has ever asked for a public office. He is a native of Nevada and has many friends in this county. Although democratic in politics, he requested the appointment, not for the purpose of securing political prestige, but with the object of aiding the family of the late auditor and recorder. His motives were well understood by the board of county commissioners and there was no hesitancy on the part of the board in naming him to fill the vacancy. Stock is well qualified to assume charge of the office and although he will labor without compensation, he intends to devote the greater part of his time to the management of the affairs.

TONOPAH MINER SUCCUMBS AFTER LONG ILLNESS

JOHN BELTZ PASSES AWAY IN OAKLAND AFTER ILLNESS OF SEVERAL YEARS

John Beltz, a pioneer miner of Tonopah, died yesterday at Oakland, according to a dispatch received last evening by the officers of the local lodge of Odd Fellows. Mr. Beltz was a sufferer from miner's consumption and moved to the coast some time ago in the hope that a change of altitude would prove beneficial. He was a member of the Tonopah lodge of Odd Fellows and the funeral will be held in Oakland, under the auspices of the Odd Fellows of that city. Before coming to Nevada the deceased had resided for many years in California.

BILLY GRIMES TO MAKE RUN FOR RECORDER OFFICE

TENDERED NOMINATION BY DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE TO FILL VACANCY ON TICKET

Billy Grimes, brother of the late Puddy Grimes, was appointed as the democratic candidate last night to fill the vacancy on the ticket caused by the death of the late auditor and recorder. The appointment was made by the county central committee and was unanimous. Mr. Grimes, before departing for Nevada City yesterday morning with the remains of his brother, stated that he would accept the nomination if it was proffered him, and last night a telegram was sent acquainting him with the action of the committee. Grimes is expected to return Sunday and start making a campaign for the office.

BECKER SAYS HE FEELS SORRY FOR JURY'S ACT
