## LEGISLATIVE TICKET OF THE REPUBLICANS SHOULD APPEAL TO VOTERS OF NYE COUNTY

But scant attention has been paid by the voters of Nye county in the past years in selecting a legislative ticket and in this connection it may be well to remember that this county has lost heavily by the neglect, in naming a legislative ticket the republicans endeavored to secure men who were qualified for the office, and who would labor for the interests of this county.

Edward P. Wilson, one of the candidates for state senator, needs no introduction to the people of Nye county. Two years ago Mr. Wilson was elected to the assembly and during the brief term he served with honors. His knowledge of legislative procedure was of great value, both to himself and to his colleagues, and at all times he could be found laboring for the passage of measures he believed to be right and just. He paid strict attention to his duties and could be found at his desk at every session. In submitting his candidacy for re-election, Mr. Wilson stands squarely upon his record of two years ago and has asserted that if elected he will again endeavor to give to this county the best that is in him.

Kenneth J. Booth, also a candidate for state senator (there being two to be elected), was likewise a member of the last legislature and during the regular and special sessions he was honored by his colleagues by being elected to the office of speaker pro tem of that body. As to previous experience as a law maker, he had none and in submitting his candidacy two years ago he candidly announced that his past record was a blank. Throughout the term Mr. Booth worked untiringly for the passage of measures that would benefit Nye county, and strongly opposed those which he thought detrimental to this county. He took a decisive stand on every measure that came up for passage and never sought to excuse his actions by apologizing. Frequently he voted by himself and the journal of the assembly will show that several bills received but one vote for, or against, as the case happened to be.

Neither Mr. Wilson or Mr. Booth have made an extended campaign for the office they seek, owing to the lack of a first class financial backer. However, reports from various sections of the county state that friends and supporters of the two senatorial candidates are working in great numbers to secure their election.

There will be five candidates elected to the assembly. The republican ticket is headed by N. K. Franklin of Manhattan. Mr. Franklin is engaged in mining in the northern camp, and he is universally popular in that district. He emigrated to the pine tree camp during the early days and has since resided there. He is qualified in every way to fill the position, having served one term in the Oregon legislature. It is experience of this kind that counts and Mr. Franklin should receive the favorable consideration of every voter in Nye county, irrespective of party beliefs.

J. B. Holmes is the dean of the assembly candidates. Mr. Holmes is a pioneer Nevadan, having lived for many years in Eureka, before joining in the stampede to Tonopah. He has been engaged in mining in Tonopah for the last seven years and enjoys a wide acquaintance. His word is regarded as good as his bend and his honesty and integrity can not help but benefit this entire county. This is his first venture into politics and it was only after he had been implored by many friends that he announced his candidacy. The mature judgment of Mr. Holmes will serve Nye county well in the lower house of the legislature.

A. H. Keenan needs no introduction to the people of Nye county. He is one of the strongest advocates for local enterprises to be found in the state. Mr. Keenan has been seriously handicapped in making a campaign as he was forced to remain for nearly two months in Los Angeles undergoing treatment at the hands of an eye specialist. He came near losing the sight of one eye through the optical nerve becoming paralyzed but has completely recovered and is now endeavoring to make up for lost time. Keenan has resided in Tonopah since this city was a small camp, and if real deeds count for anything, he is entitled to past honors. He has made numerous trips over the county and knows the needs of every section. He is also familiar with the methods followed by legislators

in enacting laws and this knowledge will serve handsly. Conservative in all dealings, Keenan could be depended upon to secure the passage of measures that would benefit Nye county and the state as a whole if elected. Consider his candidacy.

J. C. Peck is another pioneer. They are all pioneers for that fact. Mr. Peck served two years ago as the bill clerk of the assembly and during the entire term was the one attaché who could be depended upon to be present attending to his duties. During the term Mr. Peck was afforded opportunities to become familiar with legislative proceedings and it is this knowledge that will come in handy should he be elected, and he looks like a sure winner. Peck emigrated to Tonopah about eight years ago. He joined in the Manhattan rush and later returned to this camp where he engaged in the blacksmith business. Not only is he strong in the back, but he is equally as strong mentally. He makes friends easily and it is this gift that will serve him in good stead for it must be remembered that more bills are passed outside of session than in legislative session.

William Trabert is also a pioneer business man of Tonopah; he is also a Nevada pioneer. For many years he resided at Austin and moved to this camp during the early days. For many years he was engaged in the mercantile business. He is now a heavy tax payer and can be depended upon to labor for the interest of the property owners and the people as a whole. With hardly an exception the pioneers of Nye county favor Mr. Trabert's candidacy and are laboring for his success. He has visited nearly every precinct in the county during the campaign and has made friends in every district. Like his colleagues on the legislative ticket, Mr. Trabert has made no rash promises in order to secure votes. He has stated that he will work for the interest of Nye county first, last and all the time and he can be depended upon to keep this promise.
