them out for all their worth and it is a safe hazard that the working population of Tonopah will be increased many fold as the vast wealth underlying the district is opened up.

"No, I don't fear a coal famine, in the real sense of the word," he added, when asked about the prospects of the fuel shortage continuing, "but there has been trouble as I know to my own cost. Myself and brother at Reno have been trying for two months to have a car of coal delivered but so far we have not succeeded but when I left Reno I was advised that more cars were being delivered to the coal lines owing to the closing of the beet sugar harvest in Utah and Colorado. This business has attained enormous proportions and the rolling stock absorbed in the movement of beets and supplies for the factories are taken from the territory comprising the big coal mines. Now that the cars are coming back from the sugar traffic I think we will see the end of our troubles in that respect and consumers and mines need not fear any more delays.

while his agents will be in constant contact in the history of the Southern Pacific and the business originating on the line throughout the farming and ranching districts only shows what will be done when the home-seekers' movement gains greater headway. The inquiries from the middle states for farm lands indicates the coming of men with money who will bring under cultivation the large tracts of lands which have been offered recently. The sugar beet season in Nevada is now at its height and the factory at Fallon presents one of the busiest scenes in the northern end of the state. Next year the output will be doubled and after that it is up to the beet growers to say how many more new factories will be required to take care of the Nevada sugar product. Capitalists are ready and willing to build if they are only assured of the beet supply."

Mr. Fulton has arranged his office affairs so he will be able to devote more time to Tonopah and southern Nevada, and he expects to make this territory at least twice a month direct touch with one another and circulation as the policy of the Southern Pacific is to cultivate cordial relations with patrons and a quick adjustment of all complaints is promised. Mr. Fulton believes the relations of shipper and carrier are best maintained by keeping in on the bench after an illness of he proposes to give his close personal attention to the rapidly growing business of Tonopah.
