## LATEST TOTALS SHOW THAT PITTMAN HAS LEAD OVER SEN. MASSEY OF 101 VOTES

**Special to the Bonanza**  
RENO, Nev., Nov. 8, 3:15 p. m.—The latest totals received here show that Key Pittman, democratic candidate for United States senator, has a lead over Senator Massey by 101 votes. Congressman Roberts is leading Clay Tailman by 10 votes. These figures are not complete. Three precincts in Washoe county, two in Elko, two in Eureka, two in Humboldt, four in Lyon, three in Lincoln, five in Nye and 32 registered voters in White Pine remain to be heard from.

One of the most important developments of the day was the great increase made by Zeb Kendall, who is now assured of election to the state senate. Kendall has displaced W. A. Morgan, the socialist candidate, who, with M. J. Scanlan, his running mate, went out of Tonopah with a good vote. In Manhattan Kendall made substantial gains. Scanlan now has a safe lead with 870 votes, Kendall has 764, Morgan 706, and Henry C. Schmidt who is next, has 699.

In the assembly ticket George Cole, Al Kellher, R. H. Barnes, democrats, are safe, I. P. Davis, socialist, also has a lead that cannot be overcome.

The fifth place on the ticket is filled by T. H. Lynch, socialist, but William Forman, democrat, is 20 votes behind and is gaining with each outlying precinct. This fight is close and victory may result for either of the last named candidates.

The district attorney's fight continues to attract interest. Sanders, democrat, is still in the lead, and private advices received by him from some precincts not as yet reported, give him a lead of about 10 votes. Atkinson gained steadily yesterday and today it is possible he will yet be declared elected. It is figured that the victor for this office will not have a majority of over 10 votes when the official canvass is made by the board of commissioners Monday.

The outside returns continue to show gains for R. B. Davis and Alex Ferguson, republican unexpired and short term commissioners. W. A. Marsh is also gaining for the long term commissioners.

Five precincts are yet to be heard from before the commissioners can start canvassing the ballot. The tardy precincts are Duckwater, Sharp, Johnny, Millett and Currant Creek.

## WILSON AGAIN TAKES LEAD OVER ROOSEVELT IN CALIFORNIA STATE

**Roosevelt Leads**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Corrected returns from Kern county show a net gain for Roosevelt in that county of 172 votes. This makes Roosevelt's plurality in the entire state at this time 183.

**T. R. Still Leads**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Corrected figures from Santa Clara county showed 434 votes credited to Wilson by mistake. This gives Roosevelt a lead of 359 in the state.

**Gains for Roosevelt**  
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 8.—The city and county complete gives Roosevelt 75,490 and Wilson 55,946. Roosevelt's plurality is 20,444.

**Wilson Again Leads**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Wilson took the lead again today with a plurality of 75 over Roosevelt, on receipt of the complete returns from Los Angeles county. Three missing precincts showed a Wilson gain of 210.

## ARMORED AMERICAN CRUISERS ORDERED TO TURKISH WATERS

**Ask Surrender Constantinople**  
VIENNA, Nov. 8.—Informal negotiations for the surrender of Constantinople have already begun, according to a correspondent with the Bulgarian army.

Typhus has broken out in Adrianople. There are thousands of cases of sickness and not a single doctor with an European education. The commander of the Bulgarian investing force has completely encircled the city.

**Greeks Occupy Saloniki**  
ATHENS, Nov. 8.—The Greek army, commanded by Crown Prince Constantine, occupied Saloniki, the Turkish stronghold today.

**Peace Negotiations Proposed**  
COLOGNE, Nov. 8.—It is reported in Sofia that the Porte has proposed to Bulgaria to begin peace negotiations without the mediation of the powers.

**Russia May Take Hand**  
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 8.—The Russian government has decided to retain all time expired soldiers in active service until next spring. This places the Russian army practically on a war basis.

**Powers Not to Interfere**  
BERLIN, Nov. 8.—Germany, Austria, Hungary and Italy will not intervene in the Balkan situation so long as their special interests are unaffected or unless requested to do so by belligerent nations.

## ILLINOIS MAY ELECT REPUBLICAN U. S. SENATOR

## DISCREPANCY IN SENATORIAL VOTE IS EXPLAINED

**DEMOCRATIC HEADQUARTERS IS FIGURING ON ESTIMATED MAJORITIES**

The discrepancy in the total-votes of Massey and Pittman as sent out from Reno is explained by the fact that in several counties the democrats are merely estimating Pittman's plurality. This is true in Nye county. The democrats estimate that Pittman will receive a plurality of 300 votes over Massey, while the official figures to date give him but 270.

In speaking of the situation the Reno Gazette of last evening has the following:

Throughout the morning today both the democratic headquarters in the Golden hotel and the republican headquarters in the office of Senator W. A. Massey were stanchly declaring for the election of their respective senatorial candidates.

Returns were figured up to a late hour last night, and as soon as they began to come in this morning, the pencils got busy again.

Early today Senator Massey's adherents were claiming his lead was then more than 100 votes. A little later they figured it 92. They stated that more than 19,000 votes were accounted for; that only 200 votes or so remained to come in, and that Massey's lead could not be cut down. Among the 19,000 votes accounted for were 4200 for the socialist candidate, Steele, and 1200 for the progressive, Sardin Summerfield.

One of the Massey men declared the democratic vote counters were relying on what they expect to get instead of what they are getting; that they are telling what will happen, instead of showing the figures as to what is happening.

On the other hand, shortly after 10 o'clock this morning, A. B. Gray of the Pittman publicity department, declared his figures to be absolute where given as figures, and said that the republicans have been given the advantage of every possible doubt.

With 723 conceded in Washoe county—and secretly the democrats are not conceding that many to Massey here—they contend that Pittman was still in the lead by 73 votes.

Here is the way it was figured out at that time by Mr. Gray:

Ormsby county, republican, 27; Douglas county, complete, republican, 15; Lyon county, complete, republican, 19; Mineral county, complete, democratic, 27; Clark county, complete, democratic, 121; Nye county, complete, democratic, 300; Esmeralda county, two small democratic precincts lacking, democratic, 86; Elko county, two small democratic precincts lacking, democratic, 55; Humboldt county, three small precincts lacking, republican, 11; Lincoln county, 244 votes uncounted, democratic 9 and coming 2 to 1 for Pittman as far as counted.

In Lander county the republicans concede two votes to the democrats; several small democratic mountain precincts to hear from.

In Eureka county, with a few more votes coming, 55 for Pittman so far.

White Pine, 194 for Pittman. Seven precincts to hear from, which will not change the vote 25 either way.

Washoe, Massey probably will get 723 votes.

Churchill—Massey carries it by 42 with two precincts to hear from.

## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SHOULD BE ORGANIZED THAT RESOURCES OF NYE MIGHT BE ADVERTISED

**Business Men and Taxpayers Should Band Together For the Purpose of Exploiting Possibilities**

Tonopah has long passed from the stage when it should be referred to as a mining camp. Its stability has been determined and now it is a recognized town, permanently established. Six or eight years ago the future was in doubt and it would have been a difficult matter to predict a life of even three or four years. The subsequent development of the many mines here and the recent discoveries has changed the air of speculation concerning the life of the district, and now, no matter what may happen, the future looks bright.

Whether Tonopah will continue to advance from a business standpoint remains for the residents of Tonopah to decide. Opportunities galore exist for the betterment of conditions and all that is required is concentrated action on the part of the business men and tax payers. To secure this action appears a herculean task, but it can be secured if the people of Tonopah have even the slightest interest in their own affairs.

There is not a merchant or taxpayer in this entire district who is not enthusiastic over Nevada's future. This enthusiasm may not appear on the surface but converse for a minute with one of the representative residents and a spirit of optimism will be noticed when the subject of a better and greater Nevada is broached. There is nothing better to bring out all the enthusiasm than in a public gathering.

Several months ago a mass meeting was held in Tonopah and it was well attended. The subject under discussion was the method of securing better fire protection. At the start of the meeting the interest was of the forced variety, but before the session concluded every man in the vast assemblage was jubilant over the thought of better protection. The enthusiasm was created after a half dozen speeches, during which time several questions were argued from every point imaginable. One speaker grew enthusiastic. The spirit was contagious and passed from one member to another until finally every man in the hall was imbued with the idea of assisting in protecting the town.

Another meeting of the like should be held. In fact a meeting should be held at least every two weeks, or better than that, every week. The subjects to be discussed should be questions pertaining to the upbuilding of this district.

Tonopah at the present time, and for many years, has been without any association formed for the purpose of assisting in the upbuilding of this city. It is true that a merchants' association is in existence, but the ideas of the members of that organization are along the lines of self protection. No outsiders are present at their gatherings and consequently no new ideas are injected into the meetings.

What the city sadly needs is a chamber of commerce or a like organization, formed for the purpose of expelling the many opportunities and advantages that are to be found in Nye county. The association should be broad enough in scope to include all Nye county in its purposes of advancement. Attention should be called to the outside world that there is a vast acreage of farming lands to be had in this county, that the greatest silver producing mines in the world are located in Nye; that the gold production is increasing yearly; that cattle and sheep raising is rapidly increasing; in fact there appears any number of industries that could be fostered and the revenue in the form of taxes would assist materially in the conducting of our county government.

An association of this sort must be beneficial else they would not be encouraged and kept in existence in other communities for years. The cost would be materially small, compared to the results to be achieved. The agricultural possibilities of

Nevada are just commencing to be realized by the outside world, and already the overcrowded districts of the east are being deserted by some seekers who are settling in different parts of this state. The majority have located in Churchill and Elko counties, because those two sections are advertising their wares. Land, just as good, is to be had in Nye county, but of this the homeseeker is ignorant for Nye county is known only as a district where precious metals are mined.

At the present a large Carey act project is under way in this county, and as soon as artesian wells are sent down and a water supply guaranteed, the individuals back of the proposition will advertise and invite settlers to occupy their property. An association can do better than this, for at the same time it can invite attention to every part of the county and assist in the finding of occupants for many acres of land that can be tilled with but little trouble.

Lyon county today is recognized as the greatest potato raising district in the west. The soil of Lyon county is no richer than the soil of Nye county. It is true that there is a good water supply in Lyon, but an equally as good supply can be secured in some sections of Nye county. All that is required is a little capital and a little labor. It would be the duty of the association to advertise these facts and attempt to secure the required capital for the advancement of the agricultural resources.

A little enthusiasm is required to work out this problem. A little energy and the initiative on the part of the business men and tax payers will secure the results. The question now before the people of Nye county is, will the enthusiasm be forthcoming.

## BUSINESS MEN FROM GOLDFIELD TO LOCATE HERE

**NEW HARDWARE AND PLUMBING SUPPLY HOUSE WILL BE OPENED SHORTLY**

Maurice Sullivan and W. H. Weisbar, two prominent Goldfield business men, have decided to cast their lot in Tonopah and within a few days they will commence the construction of a two-story business building on Main street. It is their intention to open a hardware store here and a portion of the stock from their Goldfield establishment will be removed to this city. In addition new stock has been ordered and a complete line of hardware, glassware, crockery and plumbing articles.

The establishment will be on the vacant lot next to the Palace hotel. The building will have a stone front and it is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy by the first of the year.

Mr. Sullivan has been engaged in business in Goldfield for a number of years. He is one of the live wires of the southern city, being secretary of the Commercial association and president of the volunteer fire department. Mr. Weisbar is in the same class and has long been identified with the prominent boosting bunch, of which there is no peer to the Goldfield aggregation. Both gentlemen have many friends here and their advent into this camp is the result of constant solicitation on the part of their acquaintances.
