Key Pittman, United States Senator

With the official count of the ballots of Nye county practically completed today, the long delayed result of the election of ten days ago has been announced. Nye county has been the deciding county in the state and the result acknowledges the election of Key Pittman to the United States senate. Mr. Pittman is a democrat and was not the choice of the Bonanza for the office he sought. The opposition was along political lines and not from personal prejudices.

Now that the election is over and the people of the state have spoken, it is the duty of every person to assist the candidates who were elected. In this instance the Bonanza acknowledges Key Pittman as the senator from Nevada and our congratulations are tendered him. He has pledged himself to work for the interests of Nevada during his six years term of office and we believe he will endeavor to fulfill the pledges.

Nevada is in need of outside capital to develop the resources of this state. Federal aid is also needed and it can only be secured through the action of the United States senate. Vast reclamation projects can be taken up and successfully operated providing the government will appropriate funds to carry out the work. During the past eight years the government has interested itself in Churchill county, but all the resources are not confined to that one section. There are other districts where water can be secured and stored providing the funds can be obtained, and it is in this manner that Senator Pittman can labor for the advancement of this commonwealth.

The senator-elect is aware of the great possibilities of Nevada and he is also aware of the need of capital to develop these possibilities. That he will labor to advance the interests of Nevada has been his pledge from various platforms during the recent campaign. It is the fulfillment of the pledge that is desired.

The recent campaign was not without the indulgence of personalities by the press of both the republican and democratic parties. In this instance the Bonanza can truthfully claim that the editorial columns of this paper were not devoted to the use of personalities and the fight against the democratic candidate was waged openly and above board.

Utah Opposes Divorces

The newspapers of Utah are up in arms over the report that unscrupulous lawyers will attempt to secure divorce legislation during the coming session of the Utah legislature in order that a second Reno might be started in that state. The Salt Lake Tribune is strongly opposed to the movement and has the following to say with regard to the easy divorce law that now exists in Nevada:

A rumor comes from a rather untrustworthy and disreputable source that there is a movement among some of the lawyers of this city to get the divorce laws of Utah changed so that this city will be the "Reno" of the divorce business in place of the present Reno, which fears that the next Nevada legislature will put it out of the divorce business, by passing laws which will make divorce much more difficult in Nevada than it has been heretofore.

We do not credit this rumor. There has been no disposition on the part of the legislature of Utah heretofore to open wider than as the law now is, the opportunities for divorce. It is true that in a former legislature a bill was introduced "by request," making divorce very easy in Utah, but that bill was referred to its appropriate committee, and was never heard from again. No one is willing to stand for it, none found even to inquire what became of it.

But, if the former precedents in Utah were to prevail, we would have divorce laws liberal beyond all divorce laws in existence. By reference to the laws of Utah printed by authority of an act approved January 19, 1855, and which was Chapter XVIII of that volume, an officially published, applicants for divorce did not even have to reside in Utah at all, or even to come to the state. The petition for a bill of divorce might, under that law, be made by any person who could satisfy the court that he or she was a resident of the territory, "or wishes to become one." That would make it easy indeed; so easy that those who might wish to get a few infamous dollars by reason of the making of Salt Lake City a divorce mecca for the marital discontented, would not even reap the wretched harvest expected.

We haven't the least idea that there is any substance to the alleged

rumor that Salt Lake lawyers will ask the Utah legislature to enact laws which will make Salt Lake City supplant Reno as a refuge for those who wish to obtain easy divorce; nor do we believe that any reputable member of the bar of Salt Lake City would have the temerity to come forward with a plea for that sort of scandalous work.

When a year's residence at Reno is required as preliminary to divorce the marital malcontent may conclude the price of peace to high.—Los Angeles Tribune.
