CANDELARIAN PASSES AWAY Died, in Big Pine, January 19, 1913, John Carson, aged 72. Carson was born in Oswego, New York, and spent his early manhood on the St. Lawrence and the Great Lakes. In 1873 he came to Nevada and put the pipe line into Candelaria. In 1876 he went to the Black Hills and took part in that excitement. Returning to the coast he was associated with Conn & Trado in their borax industry at Columbus, Nevada, and afterward in Saline valley, Cal. The last years of his life were spent in Big Pine. A fine piece of road in Big Pine canyon is a monument to his industry. He was a member of Oswego lodge, No. 127, F. and A. M., and Accepted Masons, having joined in 1869. The Big Pine Masons had charge of the funeral, and held the obsequies in the lodge hall. The beautiful burial service was very impressively read by John McMurtry, worshipful master, assisted by L. L. Goen, acting chaplain.-Bishop Register.

INDICATIONS OF NITRATE FOUND ALONG T. & T. RESULT OF GOVERNMENT INVESTIGATION LAST MARCH IS MADE PUBLIC WASHINGTON, Jan. 22. - The bureau of soils, department of agriculture, has just published the results of an investigation made last March of nitrate prospects in the Amargosa valley, along the line of the Tonopah and Tidewater railway in California. The representative of the department, E. E. Free, acknowledges his obligations to W. G. Luckhart, chief engineer of the railway, who accompanied him and assisted him materially. The general geological conditions reported are the same as are found in Nevada and other parts of California. The agent found indications of nitrate in low rounded hills formed of clay strata resulting from a chain of lakes that have long since disappeared and now exist only in the topography of the valley. The analyses reported by the government chemist made of clays furnished by the soil agent showed that the significant nitrate contents are in the underlying clays and that sodium chloride and nitrate are associated. The commercial value of the deposit is said to be "quite problematical."
