Bulgarians Are Shelling Adrianople Shells Dropped Throughout The City

War Is Resumed Within an Hour After the Termination of Armistice-- Several Quarters of the City Are Reported in Flames.

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Feb. 4.—A terrific bombardment upon the forts around Adrianople was begun last evening by the Bulgarian and Serbian armies that surround the city.

The attacking force opened fire an hour after the expiration of the armistice and shells were dropped into every portion of the city, not even the residence part being spared.

CONSIDER VETOES OF GOVERNOR

LEGISLATURE WILL ACT THIS AFTERNOON ON BILLS DISAPPROVED BY ODDIE

The veto messages that are causing so much uneasiness and are set for action this afternoon are just 12 in number. One of them foreshadowed defeat for Arnold's bill at this session to permit the nickel-in-the-slot machines to resume business, as the governor has disapproved one of the proposed laws from the last session for the very reason that it would permit such resumption.

Another bill among the vetoed lot is one prohibiting the employment of miners who do not speak English, which, the governor says, is opposed to the federal constitution and treaties.

A bill making the Indian who buys liquor equally guilty with the man who sells it was vetoed because the governor considered it bad, as it made the tempted suffer with the tempter, although the tempted was uncivilized and weak.

EXTENSION MAKES SHIPMENT OF TON SILVER BULLION

RESULT OF CLEANUP FOR LAST OF JANUARY IS SENT TO SELBY SMELTER

Over a ton of bullion was shipped by the Tonopah Extension company yesterday to the Selby Smelter company. The shipment consisted of 17 huge bars with a total weight of 2322 pounds and of an estimated value of between \$26,000 and \$27,000.

The shipment is the result of the cleanup for the last half of the month of January and although somewhat below the average, this is accounted for by the fact that several thousand dollars worth of precipitates remained in the boxes undisturbed when the cleanup was made.

ORGANIZATION OF WOMAN'S CLUB IS NOW PERFECTED

MRS. CLAY TALLMAN IS NAMED FIRST PRESIDENT OF NEW ASSOCIATION

Within the past fortnight an effort has been made to form a Woman's club in Tonopah, following the example of similar clubs, that exist in cities, large and small throughout the country. The aims and organization of all such clubs are intended to promote the social, educational and civic advancement of a community, which is accomplished by having a general organization to guide and sustain smaller circles associated with it, known as sections, for the purpose of taking up various lines of work.

The by-laws were presented by the temporary executive board, and adopted, establishing the new club under the name of the Tonopah Woman's club, to hold meetings regularly hereafter on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month at 2:30 p. m. in the Christian Science church.

The regular officers were elected, consisting of Mrs. Clay Tallman, president; Mrs. Grace R. Moore, first vice president; Mrs. Charles Stevens, second vice president; Mrs. T. R. Landsborough, recording secretary; Mrs. H. R. Cooke, treasurer; Mrs. Hugh H. Brown, corresponding secretary.

The executive committee will consist of the leaders of various sections, to be established hereafter, for the study of art, literature, music, drama, science or economics, beside any special public work, such as mothers' clubs, girls' clubs, classes in gymnastics, efforts to improve the sanitary and moral conditions of Tonopah. All of these questions interest club women throughout our land, and they will constitute the work of various sections of the Tonopah Woman's club.
