STATE DEPARTMENT TAKES STEPS TO PROTECT AMERICAN INTERESTS

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10.—The night passed quietly, and the morning saw no resumption of the fighting that resulted in the supposed flight of President Madero and the success of General Felix Diaz, the rebel leader. The rebels practically seized the city after street fighting before the national palace that resulted in the death of General Bernardo Reyes and some 250 people. One report says Madero fled to the coast, and another that he agreed to the demand of Diaz and resigned. General Blanquet with troops supposed to be loyal arrived but refused to fight against Diaz. All bridges between the capital and Teluco have been burned. Diaz is expecting reinforcements. SAN DIEGO, Feb. 10.—The armored cruisers Colorado and South Dakota are anchored off Coronado fully prepared to sail to the west coast of Mexico. MONCLOVA, Mex., Feb. 10.—A band of rebels is reported marching on the city of Monterey and demanding its surrender. WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Representative Hammill of New Jersey introduced a joint resolution calling for the protection of American interests in Mexico. One American is known to have been injured in yesterday's clash in the city of Mexico. Ambassador Wilson demanded protection for Americans from both Madero and Diaz.

SCHOOL FUNDS APPORTIONED BY SUP'T BRAY

NYE COUNTY IS FAVORED WITH THE THIRD LARGEST APPORTIONMENT

Following is the statement of the first semi annual apportionment of state school moneys for the calendar year 1913. Amount of money to be apportioned, \$118,748.17. Of this sum, \$3000 is apportioned to the emergency school fund for aid to new school districts. Of the amount distributed to the school districts of the state 70 per cent is to teachers on the basis of \$132.243473 to each teacher for 30 school census children or fraction thereof; and 30 per cent to the school census children on the basis of \$2.727925 for each child. Captain Robert Scott and His Party of Explorers Overwhelmed by Fierce Blizzard

CAMARU, New Zealand, Feb. 10.—Captain Robert F. Scott and his party of explorers were overwhelmed by a blizzard on their return journey from the south pole, which was reached January 16, 1912. The entire party perished. They consisted of 28 officers and scientists, in addition to a crew of 23 picked men from the British royal navy. News of the appalling disaster reached here signalled by a message from the Terra Nova, which carried the expedition to the Antarctic and returned to bring it back. The Scott party reached the point where Amundsen planted the Norwegian flag at the south pole, and found the hut constructed by him according to the documents found on the bodies of the explorers. The Terra Nova is expected to arrive at Littleton, Thursday. The date of reaching the goal January 18 last year, was almost exactly a month after Amundsen. Scott sailed from Port Chalmers, New Zealand, November 29, 1910. Mrs. Scott sailed from San Francisco on the 5th of this month to join her husband on his expected return from New Zealand. LONDON, Feb. 10.—It is believed here the disaster to the Scott antarctic expedition did not involve the party of 66 all told but probably only Scott himself and four others selected for the final dash to the pole.

MURDERER WAS THE COOLEST MAN IN COURT

STOOD WITH HANDS IN POCKETS AS HE CHOSE TO BE SHOT

J. Frank Trammer, convicted of murder in the first degree with penalty of death for the killing of Marie Quillet at Imlay, says the Reno Gazette, this morning chose shooting as the death he will suffer. No time for the execution was set by Judge Drucker in passing sentence. The day will be fixed in the death warrant to be sent to Warden Cowing of the state penitentiary at some later time. Following the passing of sentence, Trammer was directed by Sheriff Burke to be ready for removal to Carson City this afternoon. The prisoner selected a comb and brush, tooth brush, towel and cigarette case as the only articles he cared to take with him to the death cell. During the court proceedings this morning Trammer was absolutely unmoved. He was the coolest person in the room, and showed any emotion he felt by not so much as a flicker of an eyelash. He did not even swallow hard as the court, after reading a brief history of the case couched in legal phraseology, pronounced the fatal words. "It is the order of this court that you be shot until you are dead, and may God have mercy on your soul." When Trammer stood up at the direction of the court, he thrust his hands into his pockets. He stood there without altering his expression. He sustained to the very last the reputation he has gained as "The Iron Man," the most stoical prisoner that ever faced the bar in Washoe county. Even the color of his face remained the same, whether he was listening to the court, or watching the efforts of his attorneys in his behalf, or choosing between shooting and hanging.

COLE OF NYE COUNTY CREDITED WITH DEFEAT OF DIVORCE FORCES

The history of the fight on the divorce bill is too well known to be repeated here, but the true story of the defeat of the measure should be interesting, says the Carson News. It will be remembered that prior to the assembling of the legislature, there were two men who were thought to be the leaders in the race for the speakership. One was Cole of Nye and the other Hunter of Esmeralda. Later in the fight Brandon of Humboldt made an entry. The fight was close between Brandon and Cole, with Cole showing a little the greater strength. The southern part of the state has been against the present divorce law for some time and the press has been clamoring for its repeal. Washoe county enjoyed the cream of the divorce business and wanted in every way to retain the law as at present in force. The contestants for the speakership gathered in Reno and wire pulling was done in great shape, each candidate trying to bring the Washoe delegation into his ranks. The Washoe delegation wanted the man they were to support for speaker to pledge himself on the divorce measure. Cole of Nye refused point blank to make any promises and consequently Washoe would not fall in line. When the hour for the caucus came, Cole went into the caucus two votes shy of landing the position. A trade had been arranged and the Hunter forces went to Brandon of Humboldt and he won the place. A Washoe man was given the second position and a Washoe man was made chief clerk.

MRS. NELLIE BOOTH GOES TO HER REST IN SACRAMENTO

EXPIRES SATURDAY EVENING WITH THREE SONS OF TONOPAH AT BEDSIDE Mrs. Nellie Booth died at her home in Sacramento Saturday evening with her three sons from Tonopah, Kenneth, Chauncey and Walter, in attendance at the bedside. They had been summoned three days previously as the physicians reported the condition of the patient hopeless. W. W. Booth of the Bonanza left Sunday morning for the meeting of the State Editorial association at Carson City, but on receiving news of the death changed his destination to the California capital. The deceased was born in St. Joe, Mo., August 22, 1860, and is survived by her three sons in Tonopah, a sister in San Diego, a stepmother and two stepisters living in California. She was known for her charitable and kind disposition and will be buried in Sacramento where she resided for the last 14 years, the funeral taking place tomorrow.

VERDICT GIVEN FOR \$2,500 IN THE RYAN CASE

MANHATTAN COMPANY FOUND GUILTY OF NEGLIGENCE BY JURY IN A CIVIL PROCEEDING

Late Saturday night the jury in the case of Ryan vs. the Big Four Mining company of Manhattan returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$2500 after being out 45 minutes. The case was before the court for over ten days, during which the plaintiff developed the fact that almost every one of the minor mining companies was violating the law in sinking shafts deeper than 350 feet without installing a regular cage. The case will be appealed.

COUNTY FORCE CUT BY THREE IN ESMERALDA

RESIGNATIONS FOLLOW TALK WITH COMMISSIONERS AND GRAND JURY

The wave of economy struck the county government with full force yesterday afternoon and by tomorrow morning there will be at least three fewer deputies on the pay roll at \$150 each than there were at the beginning of the year, says the Goldfield Tribune. The changes affect the sheriff's office and that of the county clerk. Whether there will be a change in the auditor's office, as was current rumor last night, cannot be said, as Auditor Johnson declines to discuss his plans. The statement is made with persistence that other changes are to be made, with especial reference to the outside deputies in the sheriff's office at Blair and Millers, but Sheriff Ingalls said yesterday afternoon that this was not so. "Frank Cosgrove resigned from the assessment department Friday night," Sheriff Ingalls said. "There was a lull at this time in the assessment work, as is customary at this season of the year. I expect another resignation this evening from among the three night men." The three night men are John Shirley, Bob Ellington and Paddy McDermott. Rumor was busy with each of these names, but John Shirley at a late hour said it had not been decided who was "elected." In the county clerk's office F. J. Schlanser, who was appointed only 10 days ago, taking the place formerly held by Mrs. Dan Tennant, handed in his resignation.
