MINERS DEPLORE UNDUE PUBLICITY GIVEN ROCHESTER

PLAINVIEW-LIMERICK DISPUTE CANNOT BE SETTLED BY ARBITRATION

Because all of the persons would not agree to submit their interests in the Plainville-Limerick controversy to arbitration, Joseph F. Nenzel, Eugene Grutt and A. E. Painter, who have been striving to settle the troubles involving that ground near Rochester, threw up their hands yesterday and declined to act further in the role of peacemakers. The matter now promises to be taken to the courts.

The property in controversy is situated in Limerick canyon, close to Rochester canyon, and would naturally have the benefit of the publicity and interest attending the rise of the latter camp. With this in view, most of the parties to the controversy agreed to submit their claims to arbitration, and the three men named were chosen. Several meetings were had, but it developed that C. N. Miller, who claims an interest in the property, refused to submit his claim to the tribunal and so the attempt was abandoned.

The parties to the controversy were originally M. C. Scully, before his death and now his estate; T. J. Cavanaugh, Sol Camp, D. H. Shea and Attorney Fred B. Hart. Attorney Hart represented this group. Then there were Robert S. Paige and E. C. Stearns, represented by Attorney Mark Walser, T. J. Scully, a brother

of the late M. C. Scully, and E. C. Stearns. C. N. Miller had also acquired a claim. The controversy revolved around the question of how much stock of the company each party was entitled to.

Before the matter was submitted to arbitration there had been considerable costly litigation in the district court here, but when the district court here, but when the district boom came on it was desired to settle all differences so that the property might be handled while it was in demand.

Attorney Fred B. Hart said last night that he had not decided as to his future course. He said it might be he would commence a series of suits in a few days.—Reno Journal.
