PRESIDENT WILL SEND A REPRESENTATIVE TO CALIFORNIA

REQUEST IS MADE TO GOVERNOR JOHNSON THAT ANTI-ALIEN LAND BILL BE HELD UP FOR FEW DAYS

WASHINGTON, April 23.—President Wilson telegraphed today to Governor Johnson of California asking whether the anti-alien land legislation could be held up until Secretary Bryan could reach California and explain the position of the federal government and urge an adjustment of the controversy.

FIRST OF MAY FISHING SEASON WILL BE OPEN

AMENDED GAME LAWS AS PASSED BY LAST SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE. Below are published the Nevada game laws, with changes made by the last legislature:

- Fish—Open season May 1 to October 15. Bag limit, ten fish or ten pounds of fish. Size limit, lake and river trout, nothing below seven inches; brook trout, nothing below six inches. Unlawful to fish within 100 feet above or below any dam containing fishway or fish ladders. Unlawful to fish after two hours after sunset or one hour before sunrise. Birds—Unlawful to kill or destroy, or attempt to kill or destroy any blue bird, blue jay, thrush, mocking bird, yellow hammer, oriole, humming bird, swan, robin, meadow lark, or any other insectivorous, plume or song bird within this state.
