Ridiculous Lobby Quest

Eastern papers are having a good deal of fun over the foolish hunt of the lobby, likening it to the hunt of the snark in "Alice of Wonderland," where the hunt was preceded by a brass band in order to rouse the snark from his lair. An eastern contemporary is of the opinion that "any senator who has been approached by an insidious lobbyist and waits until he is grilled on the stand to disclose it, will show a political incapacity hardly to be expected of a statesman of that rank." More than that, he will show an utter imbecility that would indicate that if he is caught out any night after dark he ought to have a guide and protector.

A senator who does not know when he is corruptly approached is not playing the game. He is a good deal like the New York bankrupt who was under examination the other day in New York, and the suggestion was made that his bankruptcy was caused in part by his attempts at poker playing. One of the lawyers seizing this as a clue, asked the bankrupt: "What is a straight flush?" The bankrupt answered: "I do not know." Then came the question: "Does a flush beat a straight?" To which the answer was: "I do not know." Then the lawyer snapped: "No wonder poker ruined you!" Well, we should think very likely. Still, those questions disclose very plainly that the bankrupt had been playing a game that he did not know much about. And so senators who are not able to understand when they are improperly approached on any question of legislation surely are too innocent to remain in the senatorial body.

The truth is that every member of congress ought to be easily accessible to any citizen of the United States; and any citizen of the United States who has information of any importance to give a member of congress ought to have the unquestioned right to impart that information at such convenient time and in such convenient manner as may arise. We haven't the slightest sympathy with the notion that either senators or representatives ought to be penned up in some inaccessible closet, to be guarded from approach by the citizenship of the United States. Members of congress are simply men like the rest of us, and unless they can get information by contact with the practical people of the country, they will be even more woefully lacking than they usually show themselves for the proper transaction of the business that comes before them.

The whole matter of undertaking to search out a lobby, when it is a clear case that Senator Penrose was quite right when he says that the days of the lobbyist, as such, have gone out, and when it is a clear case that the only person who now seeks to influence members of congress are plain citizens of the United States, business men who wish to impart to members of congress information that ought to be welcomed by those members as throwing light upon subjects upon which legislation is sought. The easiest way to get good practical information is to get it from those who know by experience through the management of their business, and of other connected business throughout the country. In no other way possible can the direct information needed be had, and members of congress in place of being either reluctant or averse to receiving that information, ought to welcome it heartily, with open minds.

A Queer Sort of Governor

Governor Bleese of South Carolina is certainly a curious sort of an official. He resents the enforcement in the city of Columbia, capital of South Carolina, against his negro chauffeur, of the speed ordinances of that city. He denounces the city government there as meddlesome, mischievous, and prejudiced. He has even threatened to call out the militia to enforce the assumed right of his negro chauffeur to exceed the speed limits provided in the ordinances of Columbia for automobiles. This, however, was so ridiculous a proposition that even Bleese hadn't the nerve to carry it through. So now Governor Bleese has hit upon a means of retaliation in which he takes great comfort. The governor still insists that his negro chauffeur is entitled to run at any speed he pleases in defiance of the ordinances of the city of Columbia, and every time that the city authorities arrest his chauffeur for overspeeding, and fine him, Governor Bleese appoints an additional liquor constable for the county in which Columbia is situated. As the city has to pay half of the salary of that liquor constable, which amounts to ninety dollars a month, the governor compels the city to pay out on this liquor account the money that it obtains from his chauffeur by fines.

The essence of the proposition is that the governor insists that his chauffeur must not be compelled to obey the speed ordinances of the city of Columbia, but if the city enforces its speed ordinances against the chauffeur, the governor will fine the city through the appointment of a liquor constable enough to make good the amount of fines taken from his chauffeur. That is, the governor fines the city of Columbia for enforcing its ordinances. A governor who has a mind like that is certainly a most extraordinary sort of character, and one must wonder how the people there maintain themselves in calm and quiet under the affliction of such a misguided and vicious an official.

ORDINANCE NO. 28. An Ordinance Regulating Automobiles and Motor Cycles in the Town of Tonopah, Nevada.

The Board of County Commissioners of Nye County, sitting as a board of town commissioners for the town of Tonopah, do ordain:

Section 1. That from and after the adoption and lawful publication of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, for hire or otherwise, or in any manner, to drive on, over or upon the streets and thoroughfares of the Town of Tonopah, Nevada, any automobile, between dark and daylight, without there being attached thereto and thereon a lighted headlight and a lighted rear light; or any motor cycle upon said streets and thoroughfares without there being attached thereto or thereon a lighted headlight.

Section 2. Any person violating the terms of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum of not less than five dollars, nor more than the sum of fifty dollars.


