The Sun Still Shining

"I'm going back to where the sun is shining. Everybody and everything here in New York is indigo-hued," says the New York Commercial. "Out west general business conditions are excellent. The outlook for business was never better." Benjamin F. Bush, president of the Missouri Pacific railroad, left this morning behind him when he forsook the shadowy precincts of Wall street Saturday. He left as everybody feels on a rainy day; he wanted to see the clouds break and the sun shine again. As they won't break here he'll go out to what westerners proudly call God's country, where the sky is not even overcast.

In protesting against the pessimism which enshrouds Wall street, Mr. Bush voiced the sentiments of many other than himself. Wall street is inclined to be provincial. Its world is too apt to be bounded on the north by the Harlem river, on the east by Brooklyn, on the south by Staten island and on the west by Hoboken. Thousands of its denizens have no first hand knowledge of the vast region west of the Hudson river. Its grain brokers, many of them, have never seen the wheat and corn in which they trade waving over millions of acres in the bounding west. Some of its cotton brokers have never seen a bale of that staple, much less the plant that yields it. Hundreds of stock brokers and traders have never seen or traveled on the great railroad systems whose securities they talk glibly.

Out west where the sun still shines they are raising one of the largest crops of corn on record. The winter wheat yield promises in spite of the drought to reach, if not exceed, half a billion bushels. Spring wheat growth may swell this to nearly three-quarters of a billion bushels.

A country which can produce such wealth from the soil is not going to the bow-wows—not yet. "We haven't time to look for trouble out west," said Mr. Bush. Wall street may be right in its theory that conditions are not what they should be, but there is such a thing as exaggerating the country's troubles. Wall street is looking for trouble. Perhaps a trip out west where the sun is shining would be a good cure for its blues.

Consideration Due Passengers

It appears strange that the Southern Pacific company does not pay more attention to the comfort of passengers traveling aboard trains Nos. 23 and 24. At the present time when travel is heavy it would appear that a dining car on the two southern Nevada trains would be a paying proposition and also add to the comfort of the passengers. Under present conditions passengers leaving San Francisco are afforded an opportunity to secure supper at Truckee. Just about the time the meal is served the conductor's cry, "All aboard!" is heard and the luckless traveler is forced to pay for a meal that is not touched and resume his journey without his appetite being appeased.

Several years ago when travel was light the railroad company attached the diner to the south bound trains. It was taken off train No. 24 at Mina and attached to train No. 23 and returned north. As soon travel started to pick up the dining car was removed and for practically two years the traveling public has suffered from the inconvenience caused by this act. Now that travel is heavy a dining car would not only be a paying proposition but it would add to the comfort and convenience of the public, and the traveling public is entitled to consideration.

In the case of the State Bank & Trust Co., in which the legislature made an appropriation for an investigation, Judge Langan has decided that the case cannot be reopened. It would hardly be expected that he would rule otherwise under the circumstances, but the case has been appealed by Attorney General Thatcher to the supreme court of the state, and a decision may presently be looked for that will enable the authorities to proceed with the investigation into this notorious case.—Churchill Standard.

ORDINANCE 27.

An Ordinance to Prevent the Use of Gasoline, Benzine, or any other combustible or inflammable material within the Town Limits of Tonopah, Nye County, State of Nevada, and Providing for the Punishment of any violation of this ordinance.

The Board of County Commissioners of Nye County, State of Nevada, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation, within that portion of the limits of the Town of Tonopah, Nye County, State of Nevada, bounded as follows: On the north by a line with the Tonopah and Goldfield depot; on the south by Cross avenue; on the east by Mineral street, and on the west by University street, to use, or make use of, any gasoline, benzine or any other combustible or inflammable fluid, material or substance, in cleaning or cleansing clothes, clothing or any other material or materials.

Section 2. Any person, firm, association or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than sixty (60) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

PELKY TRIAL IS SET FOR JUNE NINETEENTH


