Showing the Cloven Hoof

Reno and Carson papers have no use for this section. That was made clear during the boom of 1906 which made Reno against the wish of fossils who still cluster in the prettiest town in the United States and hamper its growth. Since the public of 1907 the commercial metropolis of the state has manifested a better and more kindly disposition in treating the mining camps. The newspapers have seen the calcium lights play on the output and population of Tonopah, Goldfield, Blair and Yerington and they saw it was to their interest to encourage and foster the men who were developing the mineral treasures of Nevada. But this gentle spirit of toleration—for it was nothing more than toleration after all, could not stand the ordeal of competition. When it became known positively that the Lincoln highway tourists had decided to come via Tonopah and Goldfield and down into California through Inyo county the vials of wrath which had been bottled up for the last six years were unceremoniously and all the vituperation at the command of the leading writers poured forth on the devoted head of the desert dweller. The terrors of the southern route were depicted in bold type and the statement was made that the roads of this section led through sands half deep and that the weather was not a shade better than in the depths of Death Valley.

Reluctantly these papers conceded the truth that Tonopah, Goldfield and Bishop were supplied with up to date hotels and that the demand for machines in the mining districts would compensate the advertising section of the excursion for the detour but the roads, which are the pride of southern Nevada, were condemned as bog holes and pitfalls and the dangers of spending a night on the desert surrounded with yelping coyotes were pictures in vigorous language.

For the benefit of these writers the Bonanza wishes to say that it has always observed the doctrine of live and let live and has always been a consistent booster for anything that would insure to the benefit of the entire state. The Bonanza believes in pulling together for the common good and it does not believe that the roads through central Nevada will always remain an eyesore to be dodged by the transcontinental tourists. The choice of the Indiana tourists will have the effect of waking the north to a sense of the requirements of travel, and, in the end, will result in good.

Governor Odde has gone too far when he attempts to interfere with the plans of the Indiana tourists by trying to bring a change in the routing leaving out Inyo county, California. Nye and Esmeralda counties stand by the agreement with Inyo county and will insist that the party go through by way of Bishop. The Inyo county club knows more about the condition of the roads from Bridgeport to Lake Tahoe than the governor does and they should have the last word.

Goldfield schools seem to suffer from an extraordinary hegira which claims the three distinguished citizens called to preside over the destinies of the public schools. The schools of Goldfield have always ranked with the best in the country and still remain so or will until the opening of the Tonopah high school. This latter is the last word in school equipment and it will deservedly rank as the foremost in Nevada. But that is another story. The Goldfield schools face a peculiar condition. The former principal and most of his staff have gone never to return. Their places have been taken by novices, none of whom has seen the camp where he or she is going to put in the next ten months. When they arrive they will find no one to direct them or to give them any information of an official character. Not a solitary director is left in the camp. The trustee have fled, and until they choose to send in some formal intimation of their intentions not to return no provision is made for the appointment of successors. J. F. Lesley, the secretary and executive of the board has removed to Berkeley; Thomas F. McNamara, one of the trustees, has expatriated himself pro tem by accepting an engagement in Canada, and Walter St. Pierre, president of the board, has removed himself and business to Reno.
