FULL OF
ERRORS

DESCRIPTION OF THE GENUINE AND COUNTERFEIT CERTIFICATES SENT OUT.

When San Francisco reported the discovery of a raised certificate of the Tonopah North Star Tunnel and Development company it was believed that the operator had limited himself to changing the face of the certificate but later developments lead to the conviction that an entirely new plate has been engraved for the purpose of flooding the market with bogus certificates.

Genuine certificate shows faint line for dating. Forged certificate has no line where date is shown. Genuine certificate shows no star before the word "incorporated" in seal; forged certificate shows a star. Genuine certificate has a small scroll above and below the year "1902" in seal; forged certificate has none. Certificate number in forged certificate is of a heavier print and the indexed "A" before it has a white shading which is not shown in the genuine certificate.
