

GOVERNOR SULZER IMPEACHED

ALL NIGHT SESSION ENDS IN VOTE OF 79 TO 45

RUMOR THAT BELMONT WILL DECLARE 40 CENTS INSTEAD OF TWO BIT DIVIDEND

The recent opening of more very rich ore on the 1400 foot level of the Belmont has given much strength to the stock the past week and it is predicted that it will go higher. The ore on the 1400 foot level will average \$100 to the ton the full face of the drift. Added to the opening of this very large body of ore, a dividend will be declared Aug. 25, and rumor has it that 40 cents instead of 25 cents will be dispensed to the stockholders. This is said to be responsible for the sharp advance today.

DOCTOR GOES INSANE WHILE OPERATING AND VIVISECTS PATIENT ON THE TABLE

MARIETTA, Ohio, Aug. 13.—With the commitment to the asylum of Dr. William Dabney became known the fact that he was crazy and not suspected until he began the vivisection of a patient on the table for a simple operation. Realizing something was wrong his assistants remonstrated and were ordered from the room. Dabney began to dissect the face and throat of Jacob Schaad, a rich farmer. The nurse fled shrieking and Dabney was overpowered. The patient died.

WIFE SAYS SHE TOOK MONEY FROM THE CAMPAIGN FUNDS TO DABBLE IN WALL STREET

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 13.—Governor Sulzer early today by a vote of 79 to 45, was impeached. The democratic majority of the legislature and assembly was victorious after an all night session, despite the governor's wife made an eleventh hour confession that she spent campaign funds in Wall street without his knowledge.

SIX MEN INJURED IN I. W. W. RIOT LAST NIGHT IN SALT LAKE

DISTURBERS SAY THEY WILL BRING 50,000 SUPPORTERS TO FIGHT.

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 13.—The police are making extensive preparations to prevent the renewal of last night's clash with Industrial Workers. Leaders declare they will resume speaking tonight. They threatened that 50,000 workers will come if the meeting is interfered with. It is believed the six wounded last night will recover.

Girl Tells Story Of Immorality

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—Marsha Warrington today completed her testimony at the trial of Diggs when she was called as the principal witness. To obtain a conviction it was necessary for the government to prove the immoral purpose of the trip. With lowered eyes she confessed her grievous misconduct. She said that after lunch on at the Riverside hotel in Reno Diggs and Caminetti went to a real estate office to rent a bungalow. When the men returned Diggs registered and the four went to a suite of rooms.

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MOVIES CENSORED AND TAXED BY FOOT IN ITALY

STRICT SUPERVISION AND COLLECTION OF FIXED CHARGES BY THE GOVERNMENT. The Italian government has planned a stricter supervision of motion pictures in Italy and levying a tax on cinematographic productions. A bill has recently been introduced in the Italian chamber of deputies by the minister of finance providing a tax of 10 centesimi (\$0.193) per linear meter (3.28 feet) of film, imported as well as domestic production. The bill also provides for a censorship of motion pictures which are to be produced in Italy, prohibiting films portraying pictures distasteful or contrary to public decency and morality, especially those reproducing scenes of cruelty, etc., or which might be an incentive to crime.

MORE WITNESSES TO TESTIFY IN WATER SUIT

RIGHTS IN PEAVINE CREEK CALL FOR PRESENCE OF MORE WITNESSES. The case involving the water rights to Peavine creek which has been occupying the attention of the district court for the past week is slowly nearing a close. Several witnesses have been summoned by the plaintiff in the case to establish the use the water has been put to, the amount that has been used and the amount of overflow from the plaintiff's land.
