MINE OPERATOR DIES.

Ewen had been connected with the old Oil exchange and came into the Bush street body when both exchanges were merged. He did little business in mining stocks and his taking off had no connection with the market.

HUERTA EXPECTED TO REPLY TO LETTER FROM PRESIDENT WILSON.

CLIFFORD PROPERTY HAS EXCEEDINGLY RICH ORE

"Jim" Clifford, one of the family after whom the camp of Clifford was named, has been in Goldfield and brought in samples of gold-silver ore taken from his property, which is situated at a point about 75 miles from Goldfield. Some of these samples yield assays as high as \$8000 per ton in gold and silver and it is said that ore is now being extracted and piled on the dump for shipment that averages \$600 per ton.—Goldfield Tribune.
