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Reciprocity With Nevada

Not a very long time ago a certain newspaper of San Francisco sent out an envoy plenipotentiary to every town and hamlet within the borders of Nevada to inquire as to the views of the citizens on the question of reciprocity with Canada. With due deference to the persuasive circulation of this estimable journal it is gently intimated that there is a more important phase of this reciprocity business that appeals to the man at home as pregnant with more vitality than the remoteness of the proposition of dealing with a distant country. If there is any reciprocity entering into the calculations of the western coast man it is the question of reciprocity between San Francisco and Nevada. Up to date the relations have been of the juggle variety.

San Francisco has constantly received the best Nevada has had to give without making any return for the same. This is where reciprocity might be practiced with good effect for the purpose of extending trade relations with a rapidly growing empire which stretches from the summit of the Sierras to the hazy shores of the Great Salt Lake.

Nevada bestowed \$500,000,000 from the Comstock to aggrandize San Francisco and to establish an aristocracy of wealth that became prominent in later years by comparatively ignoring the state which conceived the millions that made San Francisco a metropolis of palatial architecture and an art center to which the best works of foreign countries gravitated. San Francisco has been an alien landlord, extracting millions from Nevada and giving nothing.

Nevertheless there is a serious lesson at the bottom of this problem. Unless San Francisco and California awake to the importance of cultivating trade relations with Nevada they will be brought to their senses one of these fine mornings by finding others have climbed the garden wall during the night and taken away the choicest fruit. Utah is edging into the field. The business men and capitalists of that enterprising state have been planting their money in Nevada with prodigal lavishness and they are wearing the commerce of this state from the coast cities. Los Angeles has put up a fight for a share of the traffic but that city does not invest a dollar in enterprises waiting for capital. The business men of the south have obtained concessions in freight rates but they have been chary of investing to develop the raw resources of their neighbor state.

Salt Lake is acting differently. Her business men come here with funds to develop raw lands, open mines, build smelters and conduct huge irrigation projects. Even distant Denver manifests greater interest in the opportunities afforded by Nevada than is shown by citizens of California. Colorado capital has lagged to overcome the native inertia of the Sagebrush state and investors have erected monuments in the grazing country, among the mines, with the reduction plants, on the railroads and in almost every department of business. Even distant Montana is able to make a better showing than California. Men with capital are creeping in over the borders of Idaho in search of homesteads and colonization projects. Water rights and power sites have been monopolized by capital from Colorado and California is the only state in the Union which has the complacency to remain stationary while others are exploiting the rich fields of the state which made California famous.

One of these days the business men of Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles will realize they have slept through the golden hours and have let their opportunity escape.

EMIGRATION IS RESPONSIBLE FOR SMALL ARMIES

AUSTRIA GROWS ANGRY OVER CONSTANTLY GROWING VOLUME OF DEPARTURES.

VIENNA, Aug. 26.—The many of the young men of Austria and Hungary have emigrated to America that the armies of the dual monarchy lack from eighty to one hundred thousand soldiers this year to bear arms. These men should be in the ranks, instead they are earning their livelihood in the United States and Canada. The difficulty in getting recruits is the growing instead of diminishing and the military authorities of both Austria and Hungary are beginning to show their consternation and even their wrath at this very serious state of affairs.

The emigration from Austria and Hungary for the first half of 1913 to the United States and Canada has been unprecedented. The situation is such that the ministers of war of the two states are today jealously supervising the introduction of new emigration laws in the parliaments of Vienna and Budapest. When the Austrian council of ministers recently presented a draft of a new bill to the minister of war, this official expressed himself as greatly displeased at the mildness of the restrictions devised for preventing Austrian youths from going abroad.

Farmers in many parts of Austria and Hungary have long complained that no labor was procurable, all the able bodied young men having emigrated. The authorities remained comparatively indifferent, until today they find that emigration is seriously affecting recruiting. Now they are deeply concerned.

At the last enrollment of recruits on June 26 the Czarow army corps reported that 26,872 young men failed to answer the military summons, having left the country. The Przemyl corps was 25,112 short, the Lemberg corps 23,966. In all the crown lands large numbers of men liable to military service had disappeared. It was estimated that 81,000 had gone from Galicia and Bukovina alone.

Such a condition of affairs is especially serious at the present time, when owing to changes in the strategic conditions of the Balkan countries, the recruiting levy of Austria-Hungary is about to be increased by 40,000 men. The emigration to Canada is particularly displeasing to the war ministry, as few of those emigrants ever return. Over 30,000 men liable for army service are now in Canada and not one responded to the summons recently sent out to join the army.

DO NOT HURRY TO BREAK INTO ALASKA CLAIMS

PAY EXISTS ONLY IN SMALL AREA IN NEW REGION OF SHUSHANA.

SEATTLE, Aug. 26.—Dr. D. D. Cairnes, Canadian government geologist, who has just returned from the Shushana, Alaska gold district, issued a signed statement today warning persons against stampeding to the district. Dr. Cairnes said: "Only a few claims prospecting indicates there is good pay, but no gold has actually been mined, so far as I know, except what might be obtained in ordinary prospecting operations, with the exception of Ham's original discovery on Little Eldorado."

"Prospecting with pan and shovel indicates that within a certain small area pay exists on a certain number of claims, but with these exceptions practically nothing is known concerning the district."

"All of the ground for more than 30 miles square about the discovery had been staked by August 1. Even the mountain tops have been staked in this area."

"Therefore, it is extremely rash for any more people to rush in there with the idea of staking quickly and returning. The only parties justified in going now at this late season would be prospectors and others equipped to winter there."

"I think there will have been considerable hardship and suffering already due to rash stampeding in the district."


