Merger earnings were given out for the first time as \$11,000 for the month of August. West End was a star performer with sales at \$1,62 1/2 on reports that a dividend of 10 cents would be declared, but the cut up did not come.

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LUNAR ECLIPSE OBSERVED EARLY MONDAY MORN

BEAUTIFUL SPECTACLE WITNESSED BY FEW IN THE VICINITY OF TONOPAH

A total eclipse of the moon occurred Monday morning at four o'clock, according to Dr. O'Neal who was out on a call at that hour. He said one hour elapsed between the time the moon entered the earth's shadow and the arrival of the sun above the horizon, the light from the latter gradually making the darkened night orb invisible.

According to astronomers the moon was to enter the shadow of the earth at 2:53 a. m., the beginning of the totality occurred at 5:01 a. m., and the middle of eclipse at 5:48 a. m. when the moon set.

It would naturally be thought that the moon would entirely disappear in the dense shadow of the earth, and that fact that it did not is due to the transparent atmosphere surrounding the earth which bends a portion of the rays of sun light out of their course and these falling on the moon gave it a ruddy sunset tinge.

An eclipse of the moon is one of those astronomical phenomena which show to better advantage to the naked eye or in an opera glass than in a large telescope.

The advancing shadow has such an indefinite outline that it is impossible to note the critical instant in which it bisects any one feature of the lunar surface. This does not detract from the importance of the lunar eclipses, however, for many dates in chronology are fixed by certain ones. For instance, the date of the Christian era, is determined by a lunar eclipse, which happened upon the night before Herod died.

When the moon is eclipsed it is possible to observe its passage over small stars which cannot be seen at all when near the moon except at such a time. Observations of these star occultations made at different parts of the earth furnish the best possible data for computing the dimensions of the moon, its parallax, and for determining its precise position in the orbit.

COURTIER SLAIN BY A PAINTER IN A DUEL

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN SOCIAL LEADERS SETTLED BY THE CODE.

GETTING READY IN ULSTER FOR CIVIL TROUBLE

AN ARMY OF VOLUNTEERS ORGANIZED TO SUPPORT THE GOVERNMENT.

It is understood his object is to inspect the volunteer army of about 100,000, organized to support the provisional government to be brought into existence in case the home rule bill passes. STRONG COMPANY TO OPERATE ON WILLOW CREEK

LEASE ON FOUR GOLD CLAIMS IN THE EASTERN END OF NYE COUNTY.

The Willow Creek Gold Mining and Milling company has just been organized with a capital stock of 1,000,000 shares of a par value of \$1 each. The officers of the company are John Engleke, president; J. T. West, secretary and William Goodman, treasurer. The directorate includes the above named officers and Henry Goodman, Charles Johnson, Charles Wilson and H. A. Stone.

During the past five months the above named gentlemen have had a bond and lease on four claims at Willow Creek in Nye county, upon which the original gold strike was made by Blackwell & Pappas, during which time they have done a large amount of development work. The company was organized for the purpose of taking over this property and continuing development work on an extensive scale. The syndicate of gentlemen who originally took the lease and bond on the claims have driven a tunnel 135 feet on the lead, and by careful sampling from the portal of the tunnel to its face, find that the ore averages \$17.50 per ton. They have found many stringers of ore that will run into the hundreds but these have been eliminated from the average samples taken. An assay was made yesterday from ore taken from the face of the tunnel which gave returns of \$26.60, which is believed to be a fair average of the ore at the present time. The company controls also the waters of Willow Creek, which is a matter of much importance to the company, as it provides ample water for milling and camp purposes. The officers and directors of the company are all well known residents of Ely and McGill who have kept things humming at the new camp ever since the strike was made. They are all live wires and an enterprising bunch who feel confident that they will develop their property into a big paying mining proposition.—Ely Record.


