THREE HOLDUPS HAVE HEARING BEFORE JUSTICE

INTERPRETER CALLED IN TO MAKE THE CASE CLEAR TO THE COURT.

Justice Harry Dunsen has added another language to his varied lingual attainments. He considers himself proficient in Lithuanian, Slavonic, Austrian, Croatian and several Yiddish dialects but he found he could not get along with the Chinese holdup suits until he had Cantonese. His ready reference vocabulary failed to help him through the trouble and he was up against it seriously in the eyes of the law until he found a loophole of escape by selecting an interpreter. Mrs. Chong Kee, of the Chinese art store, was induced to come into court and then the justice proceeded to hear the state's side of the complaint. This was to the effect that a certain trio known locally as Slats, Slim and Doc and carried on the legal documents as John Doe Snyder, John Doe Schwartz and Billy Doe, had feloniously held up and robbed a merchant of China town of the sum of \$200 in lawful money of the United States. Everybody in the lower quarter turned out and made a gala event of the ceremony of appearing in court, especially when they drew witness fees aggregating nearly a hundred dollars. The court tried to make something out of the chatter but gave it up and looked resigned until the state admitted there was nothing more to submit and asked for a continuance until tomorrow morning when the defense through Harry Atkinson will have an inning.

40 CENTS POUND WILL BE PRICE OF TURKEYS

MONEY STRINGENCY HAS NO REFLECTION IN THE MARKETS OF THE WEST.

That a panic throughout the United States in certain food products is imminent is the declaration of J. P. Murphy, who says there is not a pound of cold storage turkey to be had in this country Saturday. This, he says, is something never heard of before. People who raved last year because they had to pay from 20 to 25 cents a pound for turkey, will have something to consider this year, says Murphy, when they hear that the lowest possible price will be 40 cents a pound. Murphy predicts a large demand for ducks and other wild game during the holiday season. In addition to the high cost of turkey, Murphy states that butter and eggs will soon be bringing fancy prices. The present price of butter is 6 cents higher than it was at the same time last year, he says. Eggs will soon come very high, Murphy says, for the supply will be short because there are none in cold storage now, because housewives have become aware that the fancy eggs have been placed in the refrigerators, while the first, second and mixed color classes have been dealt out to the public. The last three classes do not do well in cold storage. The increase in price in all products is due to the demand exceeding the supply.

LAS VEGAS BOY ELECTROCUTED IN ARIZONA

ARTHUR W. JOHNSON OF EUREKA, NEV., VICTIM OF AN EXPLOSION.

Art W. Johnson, brother of Mrs. Walter R. Bracken of this city, was killed Thursday morning at Goldroad, Arizona, by electrocution. The message, which came from Kingman, simply stated that he was electrocuted, giving no details. Mr. Johnson was in the employ of the Goldroad Mines Co. and had charge of the electrical blasting apparatus in the mine, and it is supposed that he met death while in the performance of his duties. Art Johnson was well known in Las Vegas, having been a frequent visitor at the home of his sister during the past few years and having worked here for a considerable period at different times. He was a fine specimen of young manhood—about 30 years of age and over six feet tall—of clean habits and good reputation. He was born in Eureka, Nev., and has been a resident of the state all his life, his father, Hiram Johnson, and brother, Adam, still residing in the old home, where the three children were born. Mr. and Mrs. Bracken left last night for Kingman. Owing to the great distance and roundabout route to Eureka, the body will not be taken there, but will be buried in Kingman, providing the cemetery there is satisfactory; otherwise the remains will be taken to Los Angeles for interment.—Las Vegas Review.
