WILLOW CREEK GOLD PROPERTY HAS A STRIKE

ELY MEN SAY THEY ARE IN A BIG BUNCH OF HIGH GRADE.

Jack West and Charles Osterlund will go to Willow Creek tomorrow to inspect the property there in which they, with other local people, are interested, says the Expositor. They have a lease and bond on the Blackwell claim where the high grade gold ore was obtained a short time ago and which caused a rush from here of prospectors and mining men.

Some tourists who came through the Willow Creek district a few days ago brought word of a rich strike having been made in the tunnel and one of them stated that a person could stand back from the face of the workings and see free gold sparkling all over it. From this and other reports received from the district it is believed that some of the ore is worth \$20 a pound. Henry Goodman is in charge of operations for the local people and is sacking the ore as fast as it is broken and looking after its safekeeping. It is expected a shipment will be made from the property within a short time as the tunnel passed through another shoot from which considerable ore of fine grade was mined.

The wedding will take place October 15 at Carlisle, where she graduated last year.

OPENING OF THE KINDERGARTEN WEDNESDAY IN THE NEW SCHOOL

The kindergarten, the newest department of the Tonopah schools, will open for the first time tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock in the new school building with Miss Irma Foltz, a former Seattle teacher in charge. The day's work will be divided into two sessions, half of the children attending in the forenoon and half in the afternoon. It was entirely problematical how many children would enter the new department, so furniture was ordered for 24 pupils, making, with the two half day sessions, accommodations for 48 pupils. If more are needed additional seats will be ordered at once.

Children will be admitted between the ages of four and six years, provided they were at least four on the opening day of the present school year, September 2. An expert arrived yesterday to install the new furniture and is working rapidly. It is expected that all of the pupils of the city will be in the new building by the first of next week.

Up to date the applications have been encouraging but Superintendent Smith is anxious to have all parents take an interest in the work by calling often at the new building where the little tots have been installed in cozy quarters. "We must remember that kindergarten is not a new scheme that is being tried but a well established institution that has proved its worth since Frederick Froebel established the first kindergarten in Germany in 1826," said Miss Foltz in reviewing her plans.

"Many changes have been made and perhaps as the years bring forth new and thoughtful minds, absorbed along the lines of child study, still more wonderful changes will be made in the kindergarten system. Nevertheless Froebel's well thought out principles will always last. "First, he saw that child's play was spontaneous and was always serious to the child, and if that spontaneity was led along the right paths the child would naturally develop mentally, physically and spiritually. The teacher does not pour knowledge into the child's brain but guides him

NEW TACTICS IN SULZER CASE SPRUNG BY LAWYER

ATTORNEY HERRICK SAYS CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS ARE IMMATERIAL.

(By Associated Press.) ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 23.—D. Cady Herrick, counsel for Sulzer, announced today at the outset of today's session of the impeachment court, that Sulzer would henceforth exercise the functions of his executive office until the termination of his trial. Herrick argued most of the day in support of the motions of dismissal of three articles of the impeachment dealing with the statement of campaign expenses and alleged speculation on the stock exchanges. He summed up his argument to the effect that failure of the governor to file a complete and accurate statement of campaign expenses did not constitute any offense recognizable under the laws. The points advanced caused much interest and messengers were sent for law books for the purpose of establishing just what the law does designate.

SLAIN IN FRONTIER BATTLE

ANOTHER OUTBREAK THAT MAY UNSETTLE ALL PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

(By Associated Press.) VIENNA, Sept. 23.—In a battle today between Servians and Albanians on the new Albanian frontier two hundred Albanians were killed and many wounded. The battle was the result of an attempt of several thousand Albanians to penetrate territory captured by Servians from Turks. The Albanians were repulsed. The Servian loss was considerable.

SUPREME COURT ACTS ON APPEAL OF NYE COUNTY

HAYWOOD CASE HEARD AND ROUND MOUNTAIN ON TODAY.

The state supreme court is now in session for the fall term and will continue until the docket is cleared. The first case called was that of Haywood versus Nye county, the old suit for justice fees that hung fire for years. The county was represented by District Attorney Sanders. Today the case of the Round Mountain Mining company against the Round Mountain Sphinx Mining company will be taken up on rehearing. The decision of the lower court was affirmed when the case was heard in the supreme court, but a rehearing was ordered.

In the case of John L. Roberts against A. W. Ingalls, as sheriff of Esmeralda county, the question of whether a sheriff has the right to demand commissions for the sale of property at auction, under an order of sale and execution issued by the court, is involved. It appears that Roberts secured a judgment against the Exploration Mercantile company for \$36,488.81. Sheriff Ingalls sold the property at auction and it was brought by Roberts for the amount of the judgment, with costs added. Ingalls then refused to deliver the certificate of sale until commissions amounting to \$292.42 had been paid. Roberts filed suit and was put out of court on demurrer. He filed to amend his complaint and judgment by default was taken. It is from the order entering judgment by default that Roberts appeals.

Buyers Put Up Guarantee With Firm of Contractors Engaged to Draw Plans

Unless all signs fall building operations will begin next month on the old Tonopah block owned by J. J. McQuillan on Brougher avenue and St. Patrick streets. About the same time work will be shaped up for improvements on the West End building adjoining the Bonanza. The parties who have taken the option on the ground in question returned to Carson City and Reno this morning after spending a day here looking over the situation and investigating local industrial conditions. They are John Allen McCarty and W. B. Thatcher of Reno and J. S. Woodbury of Carson City. Designs for the new improvement are under way in the drafting office of Kelliker & Kuhlman and a cash deposit has been made to secure the contractors against loss. These checks are made payable on the first of October and if the signers prefer to cancel their contracts on that date the contractors will be fully indemnified for their labor. The new building will be two stories high built of concrete and as nearly fire proof as experience can make such a structure. The cost is not stated by either party to the contract but it is said that it will not be less than \$30,000. One of the important stipulations is that the work be rushed with all speed so that prospective tenants will enter into possession in time to lay in stocks for the holidays. One of the tenants whose lease has been held in abeyance for the present is the owner of a large department store who began negotiations with B. F. Edwards of the West End company for the ground floor of the building to be erected on the lots adjoining the Bonanza office. He will probably take the premises on the opposite corner of St. Patrick street for the sake of light and deep frontage for a window display. Mr. Woodbury who is interested in the improvement is a son of J. S. Woodbury, the retired business man of Carson City, whose name was identified with the operations of the Bonanza kluge during the early days of the Comstock.

MINERS' STRIKE IN COLORADO STOPS COAL OUTPUT

GENERAL SHUT DOWN UNTIL DEMANDS OF THE UNION ARE GRANTED.

DENVER, Sept. 23.—A coal miners strike in Colorado was called today by the United Mine Workers of America to obtain recognition of the union, higher wages and other concessions, effective today. Between 7,000 and 9,000 are idle. The force is 10,000 to 12,000. There is no disorder. The United officials predict the tie up will be virtually complete tonight.

POWDER WORKS IN PATH OF FOREST FIRE

CALIFORNIA MAY BE TREATED TO AN ARTIFICIAL QUAKE BEFORE LONG.

(By Associated Press.) SANTA CRUZ, Sept. 23.—A forest fire is threatening the Hercules Powder works three miles from here, and the manager has appealed for help. Naval militia have been ordered and the police are directed to obtain fighters to be taken to the scene of the fire by motor fire wagons. The plant is in a canyon surrounded by a forest.

VILLA THE REBEL GOING TO KILL AMERICAN CITIZENS

DOCTOR REACHES THE BORDER AFTER THREAT OF SUDDEN DEATH.

(By Associated Press.) EL PASO, Sept. 23.—Dr. C. T. Shackelford, an American citizen, arrived today from Santa Rosalia fleeing from Pancho Villa, the rebel leader, who gave him 24 hours to flee or be killed. He said Villa took all his possessions and said he would collect bills. Villa told he was going to kill all Americans. He has imprisoned and robbed all Mexican women of prominence. Prominent Mexican men have been forced to flee.

BREAKS AN ARM IN CRANKING AUTOMOBILE

A. B. MILLETT SUSTAINS A FRACTURE AS HE WAS LEAVING CAMP.

A. B. Millett, the patriarch of Smoky valley, was the victim of an accident this morning that will prevent the use of his right arm for the next four months. Mr. Millett had been spending a day here looking after his business interests and was about to pull out for his home with a party of friends including Harry Stimler. The car was standing in front of the Mispah and all was ready for the start when Mr. Millett stepped in front to crank up. In doing so he slipped a cog and the crank flew back catching and fracturing his arm. In the hope of learning that the injury was not as bad as a fracture Mr. Millett immediately repaired to the office of Dr. McDonnell where the limb was set in a plaster cast. No complications are likely to ensue as Mr. Millett is a gentleman of vigorous constitution and who will only be temporarily inconvenienced.
