CORAM, Sept. 25.—This was an eventful day in Coram. Some time during the day the actual starting up of the Hall process experimental plant will be made by the feeding of twenty tons of ore into the McDougal furnace, which may be described as a roasting oven.

The Hall process consists essentially of burning the sulphur from the ore and the collecting it between certain temperatures, above which the furnace must not go. The oil burners and gas generators are in good shape. The McDougal furnace was warmed up yesterday.

COURT RULES THAT EVERYTHING GOES IN ADMITTING TESTIMONY.
