
J. J. McQUILLAN TELLS WHY NORTH STAR DECEIVED HIM IN THE DEVELOPMENT

James J. McQuillan, superintendent of the Rescue Eula and late superintendent of the North Star, returned to Tonopah last Tuesday from San Francisco, where he had been in consultation with President Zadig of the North Star mine. To a representative of the Bonanza Mr. McQuillan said: "So much has been said and printed recently regarding North Star as to make almost a national issue of purely a local mining condition; and so many different conclusions have been drawn, and so many different views presented, that anything I might say would seem to have little weight. However, I want to assure you and the public that the sudden decline in values in the big stope above the 1050-foot level of the North Star, which has caused all this trouble, was entirely unforeseen by me, and that any statements made by me, and any and all reports sent to President Zadig, were made in all sincerity; they were my honest convictions regarding North Star, and I had no personal interest in the market conditions on this particular stope. "It has been stated on Bush street, San Francisco, that I shorted 90,000 shares of Star. I state positively that I have not sold one share of North Star short. My dealings in the stock were limited by financial conditions to a few thousand shares, and I say frankly that I have not made any money on that stock, regardless of rumored manipulation and the advantages of "inside" information. "From the showing on the 950 and 1050 levels I felt safe in banking on an enormous ore body between these two levels, and particularly so when the main upraise from the 1050 to the 950 continued in good ore all the way. The drift on the 950 was extended 110 feet in good ore, where at times two machines were working side by side in the face of the drift, and with the ore showing all the way in the bottom of the drift. On the 1050 level the width of the drift on this ore was never less than six feet, and sometimes as wide as ten feet, and continued in ore for a length of 200 feet, while the upraise from that level to the 950 showed good ore all the way up. "For these reasons it was only fair to assume that we had an immense tonnage of good grade ore in sight between these two levels. However, it has developed that the main upraise from the 1050 to the 950 just happened to be run up on the only continuous body of ore between the levels, and had this raise been started 40 feet further east it would have encountered the low-grade ore and the true condition of affairs would have been discovered weeks ago. The vein is there, but the values have

been lost. It was not a case of pinching or encountering a fault. The values simply gave out and that is all there is to it. It was a condition absolutely unforeseen. In the North Star mine, however, we were drawing upon the high values of the big rich shoot that went through to the 950 to enrich the lower grade ore which has at all times been encountered in the stopes. This rich shoot lost its values and that caused all the trouble. Had that held out we would have continued production and prosecuted development work in the winze and on the 1250 level to connect up with the 1050, preparations for which had already been made in the cutting out of the station on the 1050 for the winze. The shaft had also been put in good shape and a new compressor and air pipe installed. "In short, it was my idea that this block of ore would hold until we had opened up the ore below the 1050. But while the vein is there, the values simply disappeared, and this condition of affairs was hardly to be anticipated considering that the ore had been proven by one upraise to be continuous between the 1050 and 950 levels. "I am still very optimistic about the future of the North Star mine below the 1050 level. The ore shows strong in the bottom of this drift and a winze started near the entrance to this shoot of ore showed actual assay values of over 332 per ton at a depth of 15 feet. As this winze seemed to be inadvantageously located it was abandoned and another winze is being sunk about two hundred feet east, which should catch the ore shoot on its eastern rake. "In conclusion, I wish to reiterate that the values simply disappeared where we had good reason to suppose that we had an ample supply of ore in sight to continue the regular production until the lower levels of the mine could be opened up." Mr. McQuillan continues as superintendent of the Rescue Eula and Umatilla properties.
