STANDS ON HIS DIGNITY

HUERTA WILL NOT DEIGN TO NOTICE MESSAGES FROM WASHINGTON.

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, Nov. 15.—"In view of Carranza's repudiation of any form of mediation by or alliance with the United States, Huerta can do no less than join him in an expression of patriotic sentiment, to maintain unaltered his dignified attitude toward Washington."

This statement was made at the national palace today. The declaration appears to cast extreme doubt on any renewal of negotiations between Mexico and the United States, according to the views of well-informed persons here. They declare this tends to substantiate the belief that no hope is left for an amicable agreement.

EL PASO, Nov. 15.—All is quiet and the constitutionalists are preserving the best of order. General Francisco Castro, the federal commander, is missing. His body was not identified among the dead and it is believed he fled.

WIFEBEATER LECTURED BY DUNSEATH

STEAM COLLIER GOES DOWN IN ST. LAWRENCE

VESSEL FROM NOVA SCOTIA FOR MONTREAL GIVEN UP FOR LOST.

(By Associated Press.) MONTREAL, Nov. 15.—The steam collier Bridgport, sailing from Sydney, Cape Breton, with a crew of 42 and 10,000 tons of coal, is lost and all hands are believed to have perished, according to an official announcement today by the Dominion Coal company, the charterer.

COSTLY RESIDENCE OF BONANZA TIMES WILL BE REMOVED

Thomas Rickard has sold to W. A. Gray of Minden the house on B street known as the old Lynch property, located north of the fire house. It is understood that the building will be torn down and the lumber shipped to Minden. This property has not been occupied for several years and has rapidly deteriorated of late. At one time this was one of the finest residences in Virginia City, being built in the bonanza period of the Comstock, and at a large expenditure. Its removal will obliterate another of the connecting links with the most prosperous days of the camp.—Virginia City Chronicle.

REBELS DESCEND IN DARKNESS ON IMPORTANT BORDER TOWN AND FIND SLIGHT RESISTANCE

(By Associated Press.) EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 15.—Juarez, the most important port of entry in northern Mexico, was captured by constitutionalists under Generals Pancho Villa, Maclovio and Herredia early today by one of the cleverest strategies in the history of Mexico. The federal generals were surprised and fought for two hours.

When the rebels entered, bands began to play and the people cheered. Bullets flew in El Paso, awakening the inhabitants. Many windows were broken. Fighting was resumed at 7 o'clock near the race track and was witnessed by many on this side. The federals fled. Three Americans were killed in Juarez in a raid on a gambling house, and Charles Sergerson, an El Paso automobile man, while sitting in his automobile.

The constitutionalist commander placed the killed at seventeen federals and four rebels. Constitutionalists at Chihuahua City Thursday were reported to be attacking that city and the federals rushed to their assistance. Villa, leaving with a small force, entrained and arrived at Juarez before the federals suspected their presence, taking the garrison unawares in the darkness.

SCHOOL STRIKE IN RENO HIGH EMPTIES THE SCHOOL

TWO BOYS REMAIN IN SEATS WITH GIRLS WHEN WALK-OUT STARTS.

RENO, Nov. 15.—Displeased with the action of their principal in refusing to entertain a resolution they had prepared as a protest against punishment for the disappearance of the clapper from the bell at the high school, more than 100 boy students packed up their books, arose from their desks and marched from the building in a body. Two boys and all the girls kept their seats.

Open defiance of the school authorities developed when Principal Ferguson and Superintendent of Schools Billingshurst ordered the cessation of all athletics at the school until the clapper was returned. Resulting directly from the stealing of the high school bell clapper Wednesday evening, the "strike" of today grew indirectly out of a feeling of dissatisfaction arising when the faculty manager of athletics, Prof. Clark, was not permitted to make the trip to Alameda with the football team.

ANTI-SLAVERY LAW IN THE PHILIPPINES

OLD SPANISH LAW AMENDED TO TAKE IN AMERICAN FEATURES.

(By Associated Press.) MANILA, Nov. 15.—An anti-slavery law was passed today by the Philippine assembly, after a heated debate. The law reaffirms the old Spanish statutes against slavery and incorporates the American laws. Despite discussion, the opposition vote was small.

HELD TO DISTRICT COURT.

Thomas Curry, socialist candidate for sheriff of White Pine county at the last election, was Monday held by Justice Cartwright of Ely to answer to the district court on a charge of assault with intent to kill Terry McGovern in a saloon fight. Curry fired at McGovern five times with a revolver and, his aim proving poor, he attacked the latter with a knife.

LONG DISTANCE PHONE CHARGES IN CALIFORNIA REDUCED

COMMISSION BELIEVES NINE PER CENT IS ENOUGH FOR INVESTMENT.

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15.—A reduction of all long-distance calls in California was announced today by the state railroad commission, averaging 21 per cent, and aggregating \$526,000 annually. The commission finds the Pacific Telephone company's income from the long-distance tolls averages 14 per cent, and says 9 per cent is sufficient.

ENTIRE SUNSET SYSTEM IS TIED UP BY STRIKE

LEADERS SAY OFFER OF MANAGEMENT IS ONLY AN EVASION.

(By Associated Press.) HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 15.—Leaders of strikers on the Southern Pacific rejected today Julius Kruttschnitt's offer to confer with the federated union board, on the ground that the offer was an evasion. President Wilson's move for mediation appears the only hope of a speedy settlement. Except a few passenger trains, the entire Sunset system is tied up.

CASH BOY STOCK PUT IN ESCROW WITH NIXON BANK

COMPANY TAKES STEPS TO PROTECT 500,000 SHARES OF TREASURY.

The Tonopah Cash Boy Mining company has issued a statement concerning the reorganization of that company following a meeting of directors held recently in Reno. The circular follows: "In order to protect the sale of 500,000 shares of treasury stock for future development an agreement has been entered into between Messrs. Kirchen, Ross and other large shareholders of the Cash Boy Consolidated company by which practically 1,000,000 shares of individual stock will be withdrawn from the market and deposited in the Nixon National bank at Reno for a period of 60 days, with the understanding that the time will be further extended if deemed necessary. This leaves but 500,000 shares outstanding, a large percentage of which is closely held in blocks of from 5000 to 20,000 shares.

"Sufficient treasury stock of the new Cash Boy company has already been subscribed to defray the expenses of development for at least 60 days.

"Active operations are now being carried on and the shaft is 1240 feet deep. Cash Boy Consolidated is fast approaching the stage of development where a strike of ore may be made at any time.

"Owing to recent developments in the Tonopah Extension, which adjoins Cash Boy on the south, John G. Kirchen and other eminent mining engineers have expressed the opinion that the Cash Boy will get the west extension of the ore body now being developed in the Tonopah Extension, as well as that of the west extension of the Merger vein.

"The stock of the Cash Boy Consolidated is non-assessable."

HAMMER THROWING BY BRITISH WOMEN

DISPLEASED WITH THE SENTENCING OF SUFFRAGETTE FOR ARSON.
