Retail Prices of Food Higher Than For the Last 23 Years

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Retail prices of food were higher August 15 than at any time during the last 23 years, according to figures of the bureau of labor and statistics, issued today. Figures from forty important cities show that during the year twelve of the principal articles have advanced over 1912. Potatoes advanced 100 per cent, the greatest. Sugar, wheat, flour, corn and milk increased. The average advance over August 15, 1911, was 15 per cent.
