CURED BY FALL OF AN INJURY 6 YEARS OLD

THINKS THIRTEEN IS LUCKY NUMBER TO BE REMEMBERED BY THIS MAN.

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 20.—For six years declared by 23 surgeons to be permanently crippled, fate's own miracle has visited Jesse F. McKinney, deputy county recorder, and for many years a widely known Santa Fe engineer.

Six years ago, on the first day of March, Mr. McKinney, then a Santa Fe passenger fireman, was picked up at Colton probably more dead than alive. Twice the newspapers told of his death. He was mangled when the train ran into an open switch and the engine turned over. On the operating table, when surgeons declared at least one of his legs must come off, he threatened them with death if they tried it. For many months he fought the battle for his life, and he finally came out. Crutches gave way to a cane, but he was apparently doomed to carry a "bad" leg the rest of his life. Several times the bone was broken in an effort to heal the trouble.

A week ago Sunday Mr. McKinney was a member of a party of picnickers at Marietta Springs. He swung himself up on the limb of a tree, raised himself about a foot from the ground and dropped. Members of the party 100 feet away heard the bone pop, and he was hurried to a hospital here.

Yesterday Mr. McKinney was back at his desk and he wore the smile of joy.

And he had reason. The knee joint was dislocated in the wreck over six years ago. Twenty-three surgeons did not find it. The fall forced the joint back into place, gave him back the three-quarters of an inch of leg that had been missing and removed the "bow" from the limb. An X-ray photograph and measurements by Drs. Owen and McHugh have verified it. The knee is now a perfect knee.

A break just above the knee never healed perfectly, possibly because the nerves might have been paralyzed by the dislocation.

"There were 13 of us in the party, and the old hoodoo was given the credit for my little fall. I just wish some one would lead me to the man who said '13' was unlucky," laughed McKinney.

BACK TO FATHERLAND.
