WILLOW CREEK COMPANY LETS A CONTRACT

TUNNEL WILL BE SENT IN ANOTHER HUNDRED FEET TO REACH SHOOT.

A contract has been let by the Willow Creek Mining company to Ole Johnson to drive the main tunnel on the company property at Willow Creek a distance of 100 feet, and he will push the work along as fast as possible.

Work in the mine, in 40 feet from the mouth of the tunnel, is temporarily suspended. It has been sunk to the depth of 51 feet, but will be better equipped for economical work before sinking is resumed.

The company management will investigate the practicability of the small stamp mills which are now being built in Tonopah, with the view of purchasing one if they are all right.
