INDICT TEN IN KANSAS CITY FOR FRAUD CHARGES

LOS ANGELES MEN AMONG THOSE INDICTED IN BANK SCANDAL

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 12.—Ten men, formerly connected with the defunct American Union Trust company of Chicago, were indicted by the federal grand jury today on a charge of using the mails to defraud.

LAHONTAN DAM GOING UP FAST

WORK ON PROJECT WILL BE PRACTICALLY DISCONTINUED SHORTLY BY COLD.

Within a few days more the work upon the embankment of the Lahontan dam will close down for the cold weather, says the Fallon Standard. The resumption of full swing operations will occur about February 1.

The dam's height last Saturday was 52 feet above the streambed, or just one-half of the height to be attained, according to the plans under which the structure is being erected.

When the height has been reached it will be possible for a flow of water 16 feet in depth, or more than any Carson river flood, to pour over the dam's spillway, without in any way injuring the structure.

There is absolutely no doubt now but that the entire Carson river flow of the season of 1914 will be stored, or nearly the entire flow, in case the season is marked by heavy precipitation.—Reno Journal.
