## GERMANY HAS A GROUCH

IT takes a long time for the average German to think and act, if we are to judge from the correspondence provoked by the recent publication of the memoirs of Admiral Dewey. The little American fighter gave away some secrets of the Manila attack that had not appeared in print before, and now Admiral Von Diederichs demands an apology for the vile insinuation that he was called down by the Yankee naval commander when he grew too fresh in Manila Bay. Dewey put it pretty plainly when he wrote that the Germans were trying his patience to an extent that was wholly unwarranted by the rules of war and that he had to bring the captain of the German warship Cormorant to his senses with a loaded shot fired in unpleasantly close proximity to the prow of the German ship. Now, after the lapse of fifteen years the German government has become particularly incensed by a formal recital of the facts and the further statement that if Von Diederichs had not apologized the Prussian warship would have been sunk in Manila Bay. The situation was so tense that every man jack of the American fleet stood at quarters with guns shotted waiting for the signal to fire. Moreover, the British admiral was hovering in the vicinity with instructions to join issues with Dewey.

This course serves to recall the unexplained hostility of Germany for this country which cropped out lately in machinations culminating in several European nations declining to send exhibits to the San Francisco Exposition. The same unfriendly sentiment showed during the potash discussion wherein Germany proposed to levy a discriminatory export tax on all potash shipped to the United States. It is difficult to account for this strained relation unless it is a natural jealousy engendered by the rapid encroach-

ment of American commerce in South America, which Germany has almost monopolized until recently. Sifting down the provocation offered at Manila it must be conceded that Captain Coughling must have had some excuse for his taunt of "Hoeh der Kaiser" offered at a public banquet for which no reprimand was administered.

Notice is hereby given that on the 26th day of January, 1914, in accordance with Section 59, Chapter 140, of the Statutes of 1913, one Tony Martelletti, of Duckwater, County of Nye, and State of Nevada, made application to the State Engineer of Nevada for permission to appropriate the public waters of the State of Nevada.

Such appropriation is to be made from Boulder Creek, at a point on unsurveyed land in T. 2 N., R. 51 E., M. D. B. & M., S. 10 degrees 44 minutes E., 12,998.0 feet from U. S. Mineral Monument Survey by means of a dam, and 6.59 of one cubic feet per second is to be conveyed to unsurveyed land in Township 9 N., R. 51 E., M. D. B. & M. by means of a ditch, and there used for irrigation purposes. Water not to be returned to stream.
