PUBLICITY SAVES LIFE.

Physicians profess to dislike publicity and hold that all forms of advertising by professional men are unethical. It is not necessary to go over ground previously covered in discussing this question, but, as far as the publicity afforded by ordinary daily newspapers to recent discoveries in the practice of medicine and surgery are concerned, some recent happenings have proved that lives have been saved because doctors learned the results of experience of other doctors in distant places quickly, through the medium of the daily press.

In a Utah town a doctor treated a case of bichloride of mercury poisoning by administering calcium sulphite and potassium iodide as an antidote. The story went the rounds of the daily papers and it was read by the physicians in charge of one of the largest hospitals in New York City. Right on top of the publication of the story a similar case came under their care and they treated it just as the newspapers had told them how to do and with admirable results. It seems probable that an effective antidote for this dangerous poison has been found at last. In any event doctors of the highest standing in this city have been willing to use a newspaper account of a medical discovery as a basis for treating a patient.

In spite of all that can be said against publicity in lay papers this case seems to prove that there is much to be said on the other side. Physicians would restrict all publicity regarding the practice of surgery and medicine to the columns of medical journals. The world is full of medical journals and no doctor takes all of them. These journals do not reprint with credit what their competitors say, and it therefore follows that a large number of physicians may never see an important article regarding some new method of treating disease, although it has been published in some one of the many journals of their profession. Class publications of this kind are about as hide-bound as the people to whose interests they profess to devote their columns, but this charge cannot be made against the daily newspapers. Anything that is of public interest gets plenty of publicity. Some papers may steal news from others without credit, but they do print it. It is quite conceivable, as in this poisoning case, that from time to time a number of lives might be saved by the dissemination of news of some new discovery through the world. The only way in which such news can be spread quickly is through the daily papers.

SEVEN ARE DEAD AND ONE OTHER NEARING DEATH

BLOOD REMEDY PROVES FATAL TO PATIENTS IN COUNTY HOSPITAL IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, March 11.—While undergoing similar treatment for a blood ailment at the county hospital four patients died Saturday evening, three today and another is dying tonight under circumstances which consultations of physicians has not entirely fathomed. The eighth patient is not expected to last through the night.

The treatment involved the administration of neo-salvarsan, a modified form of a blood remedy invented several years ago by Dr. Paul Ehrlich of Frankfurt, Germany. After Saturday afternoon's treatment all of the eight patients began to develop alarming symptoms, chief of which was a paralysis of the respiratory system and the nerve centers. These symptoms progressed rapidly and death resulted in some instances despite the efforts of the hospital physicians.

In view of the extraordinary character of the cases Dr. Whitman, superintendent of the county hospital, called a conference of well known physicians, who, together with the entire staff of the hospital, made an exhaustive examination. The best conclusion that could be reached was that some unexplainable toxic change had taken place in the particular medicine administered that gave it the deadly attribute. While arsenic is understood to be one of the components of the remedy, the symptoms of the victims did not indicate arsenic poisoning.

Further investigation of the details of the remarkable chain of fatalities is being made.

MAKES OWN COFFIN TO DEFEAT "COFFIN TRUST"

MACON, Mo., March 11.—Arlington Simpson, 72 years, was buried today in a coffin made of walnut lumber, cut and prepared by him. Simpson, who died Saturday at his farm near here, made preparations for his funeral months ago, getting ready the materials for his casket and arranging for its manufacture, in order, he said, "to defeat the coffin trust."
