BETRAYAL OF THE PEOPLE.

TREACHERY to the business interests of the United States and disloyalty to the flag which he was sworn to support loom up as the chief elements in the conspiracy that presents another Benedict Arnold to the contempt of the nation. Woodrow Wilson has labored day and night to secure the repeal of the toll exemption for American ships. He has striven to prove that such exemption was imperatively demanded by international amenities based on treaties negotiated by John Hay and that any attempt to evade the responsibility of that treaty would merit condign punishment. By persuasion, threats and coercion the President of the United States has gone to extremes to bring the legislative branch of the government to his point of view. That the Democratic majority has been influenced is beyond cavil and, if the matter were to be submitted to a vote today there is scarcely the peradventure of a doubt but that the measure would pass with the support of a majority of the Democratic representatives in Congress. It is true that a few men have had the hardihood to defy the influence of the chief executive of the country and boldly challenge him to go on record against the cause of American shipping. These men have been alert to the insidious influences operating to build up British shipping at the expense of an American merchant marine.

Senator O'Gorman has demanded an investigation of the reported activity of the Carnegie Foundation Fund in aborting the wishes of the American people. The New York senator asserts with the utmost solemnity that the gravity of the case demands drastic measures.

THE MILLIONS AT THE DISPOSAL OF THE CARNEGIE FOUNDATION FUND HAVE BEEN USED TO PROMOTE A BRITISH-AMERICAN ALLIANCE AND THE HOSTILITY OF THE WHITE HOUSE TO AMERICAN SHIPPING IS TRACEABLE TO THIS ALIEN INFLUENCE.

Not satisfied with destroying the wool industry and sugar factories and impairing the value of live stock and farm produce, the administration would now wipe the American flag off the seas, close every shipyard on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and turn the carrying trade of the world over to Great Britain. This shameless pandering to a nation that is tottering under a superhuman burden of taxes is an impeachment that will relegate the party "Watchful Waiting" Wilson so ably represents. Instead of being a constructive statesman he is bent on a mischievous policy that will reduce the United States to the position of a vassal of England. It is a case of the tail wagging the dog.

Ambassador Page is a fit exemplar of the sentiments radiating from the White House. When he so far forgot the dignity of his high office to sneer at the idea of free ships under the Stars and Stripes using the Panama canal to extend the influence of this nation and carry the commerce of our factories to distant shores of the Orient, he simply echoed the supercilious thoughts emanating from the White House. He was willing to toady to the nobility of England rather than stand up manfully for the rights of his own countrymen and the plaudits of the effete aristocracy of Europe was sweeter music to his ears than the approval of the commoners across the waters.

ADULTERATION ENCOURAGED.

THERE is money in adulterated milk. John Chism of Reno, who is engaged in the business of shipping milk and ice cream to Tonopah is estimated to have been trafficking in the bodies of babies by selling a watered article that failed to stand the test of the Pure Food Inspection department of the State University. Director Dismore estimates that Chism was clearing \$1700 a year from the sale of Truckee water thinly veiled by a chalky covering and hawked about as pure milk. The offense was proved and the court with a full understanding of the heinous crime fined the culprit \$10. Let us worry. What excuse has a decent dairyman for continuing to deliver pure milk and cream when he can make more money by adulterating and then falling back on an indulgent court.

By paying a ten dollar fine Chism is allowed to pocket many hard earned dollars as a return for his greedy impoverishment of an article that is largely used in Tonopah for babies. Grown-ups can-

not afford this luxury and only fond parents, hugging the little sickly infant and hoping and praying the good Lord to spare its life through the days of heartrending sickness common to childhood, can buy what they think is pure milk and for which they pay considerable more than the price paid in Reno.

If the courts choose to let such a miscreant escape with a nominal punishment it is time for every citizen to pillory the name and avoid all products issuing from this source as they would avoid a pestilence. A creature who would stoop to such an imposture for the sake of a few dollars should not be allowed to run at large any more than a rabid dog would be given the freedom of the town. There was not a single extenuating circumstance. Chism admitted he knew what he was doing. He admitted that he sold a watered product and then coolly paid the court the enormous sum of ten whole dollars out of his annual profit of \$1700 for the privilege of continuing in business.

The courts should turn such rascals out by branding them on both cheeks where the scarlet letters would burn forever in livid intensity as testimony of their shame.

The ten editors and United States Marshal Gray who protested against the appointment of Bert McIntosh as U. S. attorney, in the name of the Nevada Press association, have through their respective papers called public attention to their restless influence, exclaiming in effect: "It was us that done it!" And the chances are that the protest did have some effect, for the appointing powers don't know who and what the ten and one are; though it is barely possible that the report of the special agent who investigated the case might have had some little weight itself—that is if the report that Bert has been put out of the running is really true.—Ely Expositor.

Not one in ten was such a cowardly skunk as the writer of the foregoing with his shady reputation. Not one in ten of the members of the association libeled by this pariah was ever accused of shooting a man in the back or scabbled on his profession either.

NEWS FROM THE SCHOOLS

Yesterday, it being the end of the seventh school month, some of the grades were given a half holiday, as has been the custom since last fall, for attaining a high standard of punctuality and attendance. This month the percentage was fixed at 95%, but the method of reward was changed in some particulars. In the first four grades the half holiday was granted to the whole class, or to none of the class, according as the percentage reached or fell below the standard set for the month. In the four upper grades a modification was made, and those who had no tardiness or unexcused absences recorded against them were given the afternoon, while the others were kept until the regular time of dismissal. This was done because it has been found that among the higher grades there is less pride

on the part of individuals in making a record for the class.

As the time for the annual track and declamation contests in Reno approaches, interest is becoming manifest among the students of the high school. This year it is planned, now that the school has its own hall, or gymnasium, to make the occasion of the preliminary tryouts for the declamation contest more of an event than formerly. There will probably be a public contest in about four weeks, when a board of judges will select the boy and girl who will later represent Tonopah at the State meet in Reno.

During the week monthly examinations were held in the high school. The boys who went on the recent trip to Las Vegas and Goldfield as members of the basket ball team are making up the work lost, and the members of the girls' team who will go to Yerington next week are taking noticeable pains to maintain the average in their studies so as not to be kept off the team by reason of falling below passing in any one study. In the meantime they are practicing hard each afternoon after school in preparation for the game at Yerington.

Since there are but twelve weeks of school left in the present term parents are urged to keep closer watch than ever of the monthly report cards that are sent home by the pupils so that they may know in advance whether there is danger of non-promotion at the end of the term. More study and closer application on the part of the pupils would insure promotion to some whose advancement is at the present time doubtful. This evening the eighth grade boys' basket ball team and the eighth grade girls' team will make their first public appearance in a regular game, in the high school gymnasium, at 8 o'clock.
