PROTECT THE SCHOOLS.

THE Gazette reprints on this page, from the Tonopah Bonanza, a report that neither the Gazette nor the Bonanza should have had occasion to print; that no other newspaper or no official of the public schools of the State University should ever have been required to deal with. It embodies a communication from "The University of Nevada Equal Suffrage League" to "The Teachers of the State of Nevada." It invites the active co-operation of the teachers of the State, during school hours, and in buildings publicly owned, in furthering the propaganda which the league was organized to promote. It asks them—without consent of the parents whose children they are employed to teach; without consent of the taxpayers who provide their salaries and the buildings in which they are employed; without, let us hope, the approval of the duly elected school authorities of the State—to convert the public schools into a campaign auxiliary for the furtherance of a socio-political doctrine or policy to which a very large proportion, if not a majority, of the parents and the citizenship of the State, is honestly, conscientiously and openly opposed, and which other thousands regard as experimental at best. The last four States in which it was submitted to a vote of the people have rejected it and the legislatures of two other States have since refused to submit it.

The Gazette, regardless of any views it may entertain on the merits or demerits of the proposed change in the State's organic law, has been disposed to let the propaganda take its course; but not with the support, or even the seeming support, of the public schools of the State or the university supported by the State.

We have succeeded fairly well for one hundred and twenty-five years in keeping religion and politics out of our public schools; and, compared with other nations, we are not lacking in either religion or patriotism. Our policy in this respect is too well fixed to warrant either discussion or defense. It has been copied by other nations to their everlasting good.

The school authorities at Tonopah saw their duty and performed it. The authorities in other counties are likely to see theirs. The league that uses the name of the State University should never have been born, but its birth has placed upon authorities of that institution a duty similar to that which the trustees of the Tonopah schools saw and performed, and should the faculty fail to act, the regents will likely be asked to.—Reno Gazette.

DEMOCRATIC DISTINCTION.

GAG law in Congress had the advantage of sparing the administration from a reproaching scolding by the tongues of men who would like to see the American flag restored to its original prestige on the high seas. Wilson, as a last resort, has fallen back on that threadbare argument of the Democracy that the party is opposed to subsidies in every form. In this case and all other cases enacted since the present administration assumed the reins of office in Washington it appears as though the subsidy was not such a shadowy affair after all. Unfortunately for the people there are too many glaring instances of men who have gone to the United States Senate ridden with debts and emerged from that body with tidy fortunes. In the case of Massey it was a sheer sacrifice of professional business to accept nomination for office.
