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## ROSE FROM THE RANKS.

**MEYERHAUSER, Westinghouse and Warman are dead.** All three passed away in the past two weeks, but they left a lesson for the growing American boy. They were men of opportunity, men who had none of the advantages of modern education, and picked up what they knew in the school of experience. The first was the richest man in the world, and yet his wealth was so unobtrusive that few except bankers of the northwest knew the extent of his holdings. His timber lands in Oregon and Idaho alone are estimated to be worth \$46,000,000 at a close figure. "Never lose a log" was the Weyerhaeuser motto when all other lumbermen were profligate in the conduct of their business. This motto he carried through life and his sons are a notable group in northwestern circles.

Westinghouse sprang from poverty and through original genius hewed out a business that has grown into one of the most important in the world. He did not know the meaning of rest or recreation and his chief diversion was in toil. He labored at the bench and forge and in later years he was putting in more hours at the laboratory than any of his employes. He always sought something which others ranked with the unattainable and he usually succeeded in finding what he strived for.

Warman soared into realms of poetry and song from the foot board of a dinky narrow gauge engine on the Denver & Rio Grande. Without education he aspired to a literary reputation and made his mark among the inspired minds of the country. He was one of the people but his soul revolted at manual labor, but he was no trifling idler, for his days and nights were spent in study and the improvement of an active mind. His chief ideals came from daily association with the superb and elevating grandeur of the Rocky Mountain canyons, gorges and peaks. His first effort at literature was the publication of a monthly magazine for the edification of his collaborators on the railroad, and the title was as distinctive as the editor. This magazine was named "The Frog," and after a desultory period lapsed into desuetude. Warman had been bitten by the bug of writing and he went to Denver and applied for work on the daily papers. He knew nothing of newspaper work and was without training, and he failed to find a footing. His experiences as a tyro in the newspaper field was emblazoned in a jingle captioned "Doing Railroads on the Rocky Mountain News." He was not of the mold that made reporters or editors. In spite of his years of manual labor he was not addicted to hard work and while knocking around Denver waiting for something to turn up he met the lady who afterwards became his wife. During this courtship he struck the keynote that evoked the harmony of an impatient soul and he wrote "Sweet Marie," which had a run of ten thousand copies before the author realized that he had made a ten strike. Then he joined in the scramble for Creede, the great silver camp of the San Juan, and immortalized that mining fever with a serenade that has done constant service in every mining camp of the universe to this day. This was the ditty winding up with "It's day all day in the daytime, there is no night in Crede." Creede then was one of the most boisterous camps known in mining history and contained some of the world's most notorious gunmen, including Jesse James, the Missouri bandit and train robber, and Bob Ford, who slew him for a reward. Warman gained much of the material he used in later years through his connection with the mining industry and he soon became the "Poet Lariat" of the Rockies, as a facetious cowboy christened him. After leaving the west he relapsed into the prosy life of a money-maker, retiring to a country home near London, Ontario, and his breezy western effusions lost the flavor of environment and personal contact.

Here are three men whose paths diverged. Nevertheless they are eminent examples for the growing American boys of today as showing what will, determination and application will do towards winning in the great race of life.

A business manager for Nye county would be a decided improvement without any reflection on the excellent personal qualities of the individual commissioners. It is too much to ask any man or any three men to devote all their time attending details of business when they have their own affairs to engross their attention. The law providing for bids on all expenditures in excess of \$500 seems

to have been overlooked when a fire wagon can be bought for \$3500 and the taxpayers know nothing about the deal until the contract is signed.

Stockton, California, is aroused over the murder of an estimable lady by her Japanese houseboy last Saturday, and Vancouver residents demand that the entire yellow colony be thrown into the Pacific owing to a similar crime committed by a Chinese servant. It is not long ago that Denver was aroused by a murder under almost identical conditions, demonstrating beyond peradventure that the housemaids from the Orient are not safe to leave alone with a white woman.

Gov. Blease of South Carolina, has found a quick solution of the high cost of living. He reduced the penitentiary population of his state from 1300 to 130 inside two years.
