NO TRACE POISON FOUND AT THE POST MORTEM

MRS. COWING'S DEATH NOT SOLVED BY THE CORONER'S JURY.

The coroner's jury in the supposed suicide case of Mrs. Abbie Cowing brought in its verdict Tuesday, but instead of solving the so-called mystery, it has only served to intensify it.

At noon today word was received from the chemical laboratory at the university at Reno that the analysis of Mrs. Cowing's stomach had been completed and that after a most searching investigation no trace of either arsenic or strychnine had been found.

The case of Mrs. Cowing has been a particularly singular one, presenting some curious angles, and it must now remain for time to unravel it.

GLYNN REFUSES TO COMMUTE GUNMEN

SLAYERS OF HERMAN ROSENTHAL WILL BE ELECTROCUTED NEXT WEEK.

(By Associated Press.) ALBANY, N. Y., April 10.—Governor Glynn refused to commute the death sentence of the four gunmen convicted of slaying Herman Rosenthal, the New York gambler, or to grant them a reprieve until after the second trial of former Police Lieutenant Charles Becker.

They must die by electrocution some time next week, probably Monday. The court of appeals, in denying their motion for a new trial, set the week of April 13 as the time for their execution.

It would have been a miscarriage of justice to have granted commutation and an improper exercise of executive power to have granted a reprieve, the governor said in a statement. The case of the four gunmen does not depend in the least on the result of the Becker case, he continued, and no evidence has been offered him tending to show that there is any reasonable probability of anything developing in the second Becker trial which would change the result reached in the gunmen's cases.

RAILROAD BROUGHT TO BAY

NEW HAVEN MUST PRODUCE BOOKS AND PAPERS IN COURT.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, April 10.—Mandamus proceedings to compel the production of books and papers to disclose the financial dealings between the New Haven railroad and the Billard company are to be started by the interstate commerce commission.

This decision of the chief counsel of the commission came after the examination of witnesses who refused to answer questions intended to develop dealings involving millions. On the advice of their attorneys witnesses denied the right of the commission to inquire into their financial affairs.

In the case of Andrew Jelep, who sustained a fall resulting in death while scuffling and indulging in play with a companion, the commission held: That said accident, resulting in death, occurred at a time when deceased was doing an act entirely for his own purpose, in no way directly or indirectly incidental to the employment, and at a time while the deceased for a moment had quitted his employment. The commission, therefore, ruled that the accident of March 10, 1914, resulting in the death of Andrew Jelep, was not a personal injury arising out of and in the course of employment.
