DEATH OF WILLIAMS' FATHER STOPS BOUT

CHANGE OF PROGRAMME FOR THE CONTEST TUESDAY IN GOLDFIELD.

The ten-round bout between "Dutch" Williams of Reno and "Freck" Lydon of Tonopah, scheduled to take place at Goldfield Tuesday evening, has been temporarily called off on account of the death yesterday in the riverside city of the former's father, Stephen Williams, a pioneer of Virginia City, after a brief illness. Williams left Goldfield this morning for his home in Reno.

LACK OF SANITARY MEASURES BRING DEATH TO HOME

Shocking are the revelations as contained in the statement made recently by a very prominent physician of Tonopah that there is no way to calculate the number of deaths directly attributable to the cesspools and privy vaults of this town. He quoted from statistics, bearing on the former conditions in Cuba, Panama and the present conditions in some of the South American countries, in which the breeding and feeding places of flies and mosquitoes are proven to be stagnant ponds, water-holes, potted waters, cesspools and vaults.

It was further stated by this physician that flies feed and breed in the vaults of this town only to light upon the food afterwards eaten by both infant and adult. The transmission of any number of diseases are directly traceable to this manner of transmitting bacteria, especially in this true as to the baby in arms. There is no screening so effectual as to absolutely free the house from flies and one of these dreaded messengers of death stalking upon baby's food and even into its mouth has robbed many a mother of her loved ones only too often.

MUST FILE ANNUAL REPORTS IN NEVADA

JUDGE AVERILL DISMISSES AN APPEAL FROM MANHATTAN JUSTICE.

On the strength of an appeal from an analogous case in the suit of the Pioche Consolidated Mines company, Judge Averill dismissed the suit of the Gold Nugget Mining company, brought here on certiorari proceedings from the court of Justice H. D. Haywood at Manhattan.

Judge Haywood acted as his own attorney and filed with the court a copy of the Bonanza giving the decision of the Lincoln county court. This was to the effect that a company doing business in Nevada and failing to comply with the requirements of the statutes making mandatory the filing of annual reports with the secretary of state is not entitled to any relief as such corporation is without legal standing.


WHITE WOLF BUYS GUNS IN CANADA
