

APRIL CROPS IN GOOD CONDITION

NEVADA COMES OUT OF THE WINTER IN THE BEST OF CONDITION.

In the April crop report issued by the department of agriculture for Utah, Nevada and the United States, the condition of wheat in Nevada is placed at 95 per cent for 1914 and of rye at 100 per cent.

For the condition of livestock the figures are: Horses and mules, Nevada, 99 per cent; Utah, 97 per cent; United States, 98 per cent.

Stock losses by disease are given as follows: Nevada, cattle, losses per 1000, 20; sheep, 23; swine, 35.

The increase of the pork raising industry is shown by the estimates of the number of brood sows.

In a table showing prices on April 1, the Nevada prices are shown for all crops and produce except hay.

IRRIGATION BY PUMPING TREATED BY EXPERTS OF THE U. S. GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

Irrigation with water pumped from wells in the vicinity of Erid, Okla., is declared practicable in a brief report just issued by the United States geological survey.

The average annual precipitation at Erid for the nine years prior to 1913 was 32 1/2 inches, but during the season of 1912-13 this region was affected by the drought that prevailed throughout the west and middle west and the rainfall was only 18 1/2 inches.

The ground-water supply of these beds, the report states, is replenished chiefly by the local rainfall.

The Carboniferous "Red Beds" which underlie the Tertiary deposits also yield some water, but the conditions attending the utilization of this water are so unfavorable that its use is not recommended except where no other supply is available.

The report includes a note by O. E. Meinzer, of the geological survey, on the general subject of ground water for irrigation on the Great Plains, in which the following statements are made:

The largest supply of ground water on the great plains is found in the Tertiary and Quaternary sands and gravels that lie near the surface over an area of more than 100,000 square miles of valley and plain in eastern Colorado and New Mexico and in western Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

Because of improvements in pumping machinery—especially in internal-combustion engines—water can be pumped at less cost now than formerly, and on account of improved methods of irrigation and agriculture and better adaptation of crops to water supply the value of pumped water has been increased.

With good management pumping for irrigation is now generally feasible

where the water level stands within twenty-five or perhaps fifty feet of the surface, and water for the irrigation of vegetables and fruit can be pumped where the depth to water is even greater.

It is well established that the water supply does not come chiefly from the mountains, as is still popularly believed, but from the rain and snow that falls on the great plains. The fact that the source of supply is local is not unfavorable, as is supposed by many persons, but rather means that the intake area is extensive and that therefore the total supply is large, even though only a small part of the precipitation percolates to the ground-water level.

The water in any particular part of the region, however, must be used in that part and is not available for use in some distant area. The supply that can be utilized in any locality is thus limited, and the development of the entire region to its maximum capacity requires that the pumping plants be widely distributed over the shallow-water areas.

ARCHITECTURE OF COMSTOCK DAYS RECALLS STORY

OLD EDGINGTON HOME IN VIRGINIA CITY NOW BEING TORN DOWN.

"I see by this paper," said the reader, in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, "that they are dismantling the old Edgington home in Virginia City, Nev. The utter disregard for the antique and historical," he continued,

"is appalling. This residence was one of those elegant affairs built by the fortunate during the boom days of the lode. It was situated on the west side of the street in the vicinity of the homes of James G. Fair and John W. Mackey. It was set on an eminence above the street, the garden being abutted by a huge stone wall with an esplanade of stone steps.

He lived there only about four years after its completion and then sold out, house, furniture and all, for about what it cost him, to a millman there by the name of Lynch. This man, before purchasing the Edgington place, lived near the Round house and made a good-sized fortune working ores in a mill which he owned there. It used to be said of Lynch that he handed out twenty dollar pieces to his daughters as freely as another man might a penny or twenty-five cent piece. Lynch made many additional improvements to the place, such as putting bow windows on the second story and south wall. This was pretty expensive business at the time, but money was no object to him. He saved all of the tellings

of his mill and these were reputed to contain vast fortunes, but owing to the crude methods of milling then in vogue, did not appear to be workable. Many different people tested these slimes and always found values in them. Finally, Lynch went broke and afterward died, leaving his widow in possession of the slimes.

Various reports as to the sums of money which she was offered for them were rife. These sums ranged, according to rumor, from \$29,000 to \$100,000. An assayer on the Comstock at that time, by the name of Wiegand, spent all he had experimenting on them, but finally going broke, he killed himself by strangulation.

"The stone wall abutting the garden of this house was made of stone formerly used in the construction of the old Curry mill, one of the most pretentious and costly mills ever erected on the lode.

"The situation of this place as an eminence overlooking the desert towards the east made it a fine setting for a romance, which fact was taken advantage of by a novelist who made the Comstock the setting for her story and this mansion the dwelling place for her heroine."

JUDGE LANGAN DECIDES QUESTION OF FILING DIVORCE

Yesterday morning in the district court Judge Langan decided the disputed question in the divorce case of Andrew C. Waltz vs. Anna C. Waltz, which had been argued Saturday in the district court by Attorney Platt for the defendant and Attorney Sweeney for the plaintiff. Mr. Platt contended that the case should be dismissed, as the plaintiff had not filed his case prior to the 31st day of December, and as such was barred by the new divorce law which went into effect on January 1st, the plaintiff having only been a resident of the city and state for six months, and his contention was upheld by the court.—Carson News.
