TONOPAH BEST PLACE IN COUNTRY FOR MILL IDEAS

William J. Tobin, president of the Pioneer Consolidated, is in Tonopah for the purpose of inspecting the system of milling in practice here. He is very much impressed with the importance of Tonopah as a milling center and he says the advantages of this place in that respect should be more generally advertised to the world.

The Pioneer operates with a capacity of 30 tons daily and Manager Tobin is going to add a Huntington mill with the idea of doubling the tonnage at relatively small expense. He also may make other changes to reduce the amount of cyaniding. He is now treating at a profit ore averaging between 36 and 38 a ton and wants the highest efficiency.

The mine is looking better than ever and ore is being taken from an immense flat vein thirty feet in width that runs into the mountain. Between 15 and 22 men are regularly employed, but during the installation of the Huntington mill the stamps will be shut down. This will occupy about two weeks. The district is looking better than ever. The Indiana started last Tuesday for a long campaign and the Mary Starr, 1000 feet south of the Pioneer shaft, has opened some wonderful ore directly on the surface. W. L. Marks owns this property and he has a reputation of always striking something good. He was one of the original locators of the Mayflower and has been devoting all his spare time to prospecting on the Starr. At the point on the surface where he found this outcropping he sank and is now down about four feet on a ledge that gives a long string of gold in every panning.

TROUBLE IN IMPERIAL VALLEY APPREHENDED BY SETTLERS

(By Associated Press.) CALIFORNIA, April 22.—With seventy-four American cavalrymen on alert within a short distance of the barracks of Mexicali and a Huerta garrison of 600 men, people along the international border are more calm, but elsewhere in the Imperial valley where ranchers whose property depends on the safety of irrigation takes on the Mexican side, they are apprehensive despite assurances from Colonel Cantu, commanding the Mexican garrison, that he would protect the irrigation system. Ranchers are to organize to act with the cavalry.

MEXICAN CHANGE NOT YET CALLED OUT OF COUNTRY

EXPECTS AT ANY MOMENT TO ASK FOR PASSPORTS HOME.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, April 22.—Senor Algara, the Mexican charge d'affaires, said he received messages from his government which indicated he might be recalled at any moment, but had not yet been ordered to ask for his passports. He looked for the order at any time. A meeting of the executive committee of the American red cross has been called for late today by the war department, for the purpose of preparing for emergencies in Mexico.

PEACE TALK BY MANN OF CHICAGO

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—"I don't believe we ought to engage in war with Mexico at this time for the reason suggested by the president," said Representative Mann in the house this morning, in speaking to the war resolution. "Mr. Speaker, if we pass this resolution we have entered on war. Already we have fired and killed Mexican citizens, already we are involved in war with Mexico. I believe we ought to be patriotic enough to try to secure peace. I have believed the 'watchful waiting' policy would involve us in war, but I had hoped to prevent it."

MEXICAN PRISONERS TAKEN TO SHIPS ANOTHER BATTLE ON AT DELAGUA WITH THE MILITIA

(By Associated Press.) VERA CRUZ, April 22.—A party of marines advanced into the central portion of Vera Cruz under cover of fire from the big guns of the United States battleships, using machine guns and rifles, killed a few Mexicans and arrested a large number of them, sending them to the ships as prisoners. Then they made a thorough search of the house-tops and arrested all straggling snipers.

DANGERS OF PUTRIFICATION OF SOIL.

A careful perusal of the Farmers' Bulletin No. 270-527, issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, brings out the facts that while the government does recommend certain plans for the individual disposal of sewage as a relief from vaults and cess-pools, these recommendations are intended only for the rural home where no other mode of disposal is available, and under certain restrictions that must be carefully followed, otherwise the dangers of putrefaction of soil is as imminent as under the old methods in vogue on farms and in sparsely populated communities.

Quoting from the investigations, contained in Bulletin No. 527, page 26, of C. A. Ocock and W. H. Wright, of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Madison, Wis., or W. C. Davidson, of the Engineering Experiment Station at Columbia, Mo., of Oscar Erf, of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Manhattan, Kans., and of W. H. Booker of the North Carolina Board of Health, and after indicating the designs of various individual disposal systems the salient remarks follow:
"The tank should be constructed as nearly water-tight as possible, preferably of concrete, and some means should be provided at the bottom to facilitate the cleaning out of the settled sludge."
"The tank should be at least 175 feet away from the house, and the sewer from the house should be vitrified sewer pipe with carefully cemented joints and laid to a grade of not less than one foot to the 100 feet."

On page 29, of Bulletin No. 270, the following is worthy of mention in connection with the care of septic tanks for individual sewage disposal:
"It is necessary to inspect the chamber from time to time, and if undissolved solids accumulate to have them removed, probably about once a year."

"This accumulation when removed should be carried to the field and spaded into the soil at once."
Pages 25 to 29 on septic tanks state that tanks are designed on a basis of water consumption of from 60 to 100 gallons of water per person per day.

Pages 34-5 have this to say, in part, on surface and sub-surface irrigation:
"The sewage of a home that has a complete water carriage system is not offensive at first, because the organic matter is so small a percentage of the entire amount." Then follows a lengthy description of systems of outlets that are necessary for distribution of effluent over different fields, intermittently, to avoid the dangers of saturating the ground.
