**DYNAMITE IN PIECE OF WOOD EXPLODES**

**FIREPLACE IN THE CLAPP RESIDENCE WRECKED BY AN EXPLOSION.**

Harry B. Clapp, superintendent of the Florence mine; Mrs. Clapp, Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Dannenberg and Miss Clairmond Withers, while seated around a newly constructed tile fireplace in the living room of the Clapp home at the property about 9:30 o'clock, Tuesday night, narrowly escaped injury when half of a stick of dynamite in one of the burning pieces of mine timber exploded. Fortunately none of the members of the party was hurt.

The explosion practically wrecked the new fireplace and scattered sparks, tiling, ashes and wood over the room, ruining a large rug. One of the timbers, which had been sawed in three and a half foot lengths, narrowly missed Mrs. Clapp in its flight across the room. Mr. Clapp stated that the timber had been removed from an old working in the mine by the use of dynamite, half sticks being placed in auger holes sunk in the ends, and that it was apparent that the powder placed in the piece of timber which exploded in the fireplace had missed fire in the mine.—Tribune.

**ERA OF REVIVAL AT CHERRY CREEK**

**OLD CAMP DECLARED TO BE COMING BACK AFTER YEARS OF QUIET.**

Judge J. H. Leishman, of Cherry Creek, Nev., accompanied by Mrs. Leishman, is in the city on mining business, says the Salt Lake Tribune. He says that the old camp, which has been very quiet for several years, is showing signs of revival that he believes foreshadow an era of activity and prosperity. The recent gold strike made by George O. Kelsey in Egan canyon seems to be an important one. The ore showing at present is eight inches wide and Mr. Leishman saw one assay from it that ran \$1029 to the ton. Mr. Kelsey expects to be in the Salt Lake market with a carload of ore from this strike before long.

Judge Leishman says the old Glasgow & Western property, now the Nevada Star, is working about forty-five men and running the mill steadily. The Wide West mill has been leased to William Watson, a veteran Cherry Creek miner and operator, who is sorting up and putting through it a lot of Cocomongo ore that runs about \$20 and \$22. Watson has recently acquired the old Joanna property by purchase and will send some of its products to the mill.

The North Mountain property in Egan canyon, famous in the years just after the civil war, when its manager was General Rosenkranz, is now owned chiefly by John Dern and Salt Lake associates. On this property there is a tunnel 1600 feet long, that in view of recent developments may prove an important avenue in the opening up of that section.

Judge Leishman is enthusiastic as to the future of the Cherry Creek section in a mining way and believes that the old camp after these years of quiet is soon to come into its own. He says some important mining deals are pending, which are likely to be of great importance to that section.

**CHARLES HENDERSON IS CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR**

Word was received in this city last evening that Charles Henderson, of Elko, had announced himself in Reno as a Democratic candidate for governor and would start at once campaigning for the position. This puts three Democratic candidates in the running, being Gilbert Ross, Lem Allen and Henderson. The more the merrier.—Carson News.

**HEAVY CUT IN EXPRESS RATES**

**WELLS-FARGO AFTER CONFERENCE ON STATE CHARGES, AGREES WITH COMMISSION.**

Wells-Fargo express rates within the state of Nevada will be lowered an average of 25 per cent as a result of a conference just concluded between the officials of the company, headed by General Traffic Manager Lockwood, of San Francisco, and the railroad commission of Nevada at Carson City. By July it is expected new tariffs will be published by the express company which will set the Reno commission and produce houses, creameries and jobbing houses on a basis of better than equality with Sacramento and other outside points which have been monopolizing Nevada territory because of discriminating charges.

**EXISTENCE OF TIN IN GOLD PLACERS**

**CARLIN PROSPECTORS REPORT HAVING HAD HIGH ASSAYS.**

Wm. E. Barney, who comes in every spring from his placer claims in the Lynn district north of Carlin, made his annual trip yesterday and brought with him over \$800 in gold nuggets that he had washed out during the past spring. He says the report that the placer miners of that district have found tin is correct, as they have lately had two assays made that carried 78 per cent. For a number of years the miners have been bothered with a brownish metal that remained in the cleanup with the gold and was so heavy that the only way to get rid of it was to pick it out by hand from the gold, and it has always been believed that it was iron, but he now says he is convinced that it is tin. The metal is found in nuggets from the size of a pinhead up to a size weighing ten pounds, and has been thrown away as of no value. As tin is worth \$620 per ton this will add to the value of the placer grounds.
