### WATCH THE CATTLEMEN.

WHEN the cattlemen talk of economy and the necessity for naming candidates from the range country it is time to look for that Senegambian in the woodpile. The range barons are generous in their criticisms of others, but their cry of retrenchment does not fit well with their demand for the appointment of as many inspectors as they have in Utah. Nevada manages to get along all right with the present system and any attempt to foist off another bunch of officeholders should be promptly rebuked. The Bonanza stands for retrenchment and economy with the knife applied without stint. There are more than sufficient men drawing sustenance from the public teat now and the limit was reached some years ago. If tax payers want economy let economy come, but if extravagance and looting is to be perpetuated then have a grand sacking of the treasury. Under the thin veneer of economy it is commonly understood the cattlemen have an axe of their own to grind. They are going to try to capture both Democratic and Republican conventions with the one dominant idea of placing men in office who will see that the range interests continue to enjoy undeserved immunity from paying taxes the same as the plain people. The stock interests were never suspected of supporting a bequeval order and the old cow punchers are not going to change their colors at this day. They have no pretext for begging clemency at this time. They are receiving the highest prices ever known in the history of the industry and the people are sorely tried by the constantly rising prices of beef and mutton. The cattle barons are enjoying prosperity as they never enjoyed it before, and the fact that they cannot be allowed to continue tax dodging is a warning from the people that if they persist in their contumacious course they will arouse the lawmakers to a frame of mind that may be more drastic than what has already been experienced. Investigation reveals the fact that Elko and Humboldt counties have been buffaloes by the stock interests and it is a notorious admission that Elko county alone has had to add 90,000 acres of range and farm lands to the list of taxable property which had been omitted from the tax rolls of that county from time immemorial. If this important omission could be continued on the books of the county that is avowedly a cattlemen's principality the taxpayers can understand what would happen if these men had their own way in running the state. They are the men who would like to see the mines and farms taxed to extinction. The fewer farmers the better it is for the range riders.

The twin judiciary law is more than likely to be upheld by the State Supreme court and the matter will be up to the governor for correction. In issuing the call Governor Oddie should not allow any other subject to be considered. The legislature should be held down tight to the single proposition of amending the law to carry out the wishes of the people and introduce the wedge of economy. Make the call specific and let the legislature have the decency to meet and adjourn within forty-eight hours.

## First Normal School In Country

THEN and NOW

Seventy-five years ago today the first state normal school in the United States was opened in Lexington, Mass. The parlor of a boarding house was the cradle of this educational system. In those days it was thought that a school "to teach teachers how to teach" was a needless expenditure of time and money. Unable to secure state aid, the pioneers accepted money offered by Edmund Dwight, who later became conspicuously identified with the new educational movement. The first class, consisting of five girls, had the Rev. Cyrus Pierce, of Naantucket, as its teacher. At the end of the first year the school, known as the Lexington academy, had twenty-five students—all girls. It had demonstrated its worth so thoroughly that the legislature voted by a large majority to appropriate sufficient funds to establish it as a permanent adjunct to the educational system.

Today the normal school is an indispensable part of the public school system throughout the United States. It exerts a commanding influence over the 523,000 school teachers who are instructing 18,000,000 school children. The old-time pedagogue, who was considered efficient if he or she had mastered the three R's, is giving way to the highly trained normal school graduate who has spent two more years in diligent study to prepare for the profession. There are more than 300 public and private normal schools in the United States today. The number of prospective teachers enrolled as students aggregates nearly 100,000, of which three-fourths are women. The graduates from the higher teachers' institutions are masters of curriculums equal to those of the most advanced universities—several of these institutions grant pedagogical degrees. The normal school exists today in practically every civilized country.

## MINING CAMP IS ALL BUT A MEMORY

MASONRY VAULT AND TWO ELDERLY CHINESE STILL REMAIN AT GOLD CREEK.

OGDEN, July 3.—A vault of solid masonry, still in good condition, standing on the hillside like a monument, and two elderly Chinese men are nearly all that remains of the mining camp at Gold Creek, Nev., according to Q. R. Craft, fiscal agent of the Fourth forestry district, who is now on an inspection trip to several forest headquarters in Nevada. It is a poor showing, comments the forestry official, considering that forty years ago thousands of dollars worth of gold was placer mined in this very spot.

There are still a few old ditches, extensive shallow excavations, evidently the result of water artificially applied, according to Mr. Craft, but the two old Chinese, known locally as Lem and Joe, are about the only living evidence of the once prosperous camp. A few prospectors still spend the summers there, and Lem, whose right name is Hong Lee, conducts a little store in connection with his mining operations. Although he is 80 years old, the forestry official found that his account books, which he keeps in Chinese, are models of neatness.

Fifteen years ago, Mr. Craft reports, an effort was made to obtain gold from the presumed mother lode at Gold Creek. A mine was opened and a mill erected. The camp contained, including the workmen on the improvements, 2,000 people, but the quartz mining has not as yet proved profitable. J. R. Hardman is principal citizen of the real town of Gold Creek. He owns the townsite, runs the postoffice, store and hotel.

Mr. Craft expects to visit the headquarters of the Ruby and Humboldt national forests in Nevada before returning to Ogden.

It is the intention of the company to at once begin operations in search of the pay values in the fissure vein that is supposed to nearly parallel the tunnel, which is now in 4,100 feet. "For some time we have been finding lead in the granite formation that has been penetrated by the tunnel, indicating the close proximity of the vein," said Mr. Miller, "and upon my return to camp the mine superintendent will be instructed to at once start a crosscut to the fissure vein."
