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### BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION.

**N**YE county Republicans will have a full ticket in the field at the coming election. The direct issue will be economy, retrenchment and efficiency. If the voters want that sort of an administration they cannot do anything else than support the class of men who will appear on the ticket nominated by the Republicans of Nye county. There will be no trading or juggling of offices, but it will be a clear cut issue between the present courthouse gang that has proven its incompetency through several terms and the prospect of giving the taxpayer some return for his money. The thread of kinship and family affiliation that has characterized the rule of the courthouse will be sundered for the public good. Nothing short of a complete rejuvenation of the administration will do and the Republicans propose to make their campaign on this one issue.

In the first place, the party will go on record for the abolishment of ornamental officers, superfluous deputies and honorary officials who think the public should be tickled to death by paying them salaries for doing nothing and then relegating all the work of their departments to deputies who have to be paid out of the county treasury. This is the direct issue. Elective officers on the Republican platform will be pledged to practical work. They will go before the voters with the solemn declaration that they will personally attend to the duties of their offices instead of compelling the people to pay for another official to do the work for which the elective officer is paid. It is a remarkable fact that the only incumbent of a county office, as at present organized, who manages to worry along without a deputy is the Republican county clerk, and it is equally noteworthy that he is the only executive who can always be found at his office during office hours and frequently far into the night. Others find plenty of time to attend to private business. These men have subordinated public business to the demands of other interests. The lucrative positions they hold are not equal to their greedy demands and they employ the time for which the public pays in taking care of outside business. These men are more frequently found on Main street, around the lobbies of the hotels, in the front chairs of the brokers' offices, or enjoying themselves at the clubs or social gatherings, leaving the dispatch of county affairs to subordinates. This decision of the Republican County Central committee to make the campaign on the business-like administration will appeal forcibly to the masses of voters who are weary of seeing public servants transformed into public bosses.

**THIS POLICY WILL EFFECT A SAVING OF AT LEAST \$6,600 A YEAR.** The saving to be made by dispensing with supernumeraries may be summed up briefly as follows:

- RECORDER'S OFFICE—One deputy at \$1,800 per annum.
- TREASURER'S OFFICE—One deputy eight months, \$1,200.
- SHERIFF'S OFFICE—One deputy at \$1,800 per annum.
- CHIEF OF POLICE—One deputy at \$1,800 per annum.
- TOTAL SAVING IN SALARIES, \$6,600 PER ANNUM.

The Republican nominees will be men with business heads who have made a success of their own business and therefore can be relied upon to make a success of public business.

### MINERALS NOT RESERVED.

**U**NDER a recent ruling holders of Carey act lands are owners in fee simple and the lands are not subject to mineral reservation. This means that if subsequent to patent mineral is discovered the United States would have no claim to the mineral, nor would the patent be subject to cancellation because of such discovery. This is the gist of an opinion of the acting commissioner of the general land office and clears up the title to many such areas scattered over the west, the mountain states in particular.

The decision is the result of an inquiry set on foot by Representative Mondell, in behalf of a constituent who desired to drill for oil on Carey act land in Wyoming. The patent from the state contained a reservation of the minerals in the following language: "With particular reference to the exclusion of all mineral lands, should any be found to exist in the tracts aforesaid."

The state land commissioner of Wyoming advised that "the patent issued by the United States and the state of Wyoming transferring the Carey act lands provides that lands upon which mineral is discovered shall not pass under the patent." Inspection of the government's patent to the state revealed the fact that it contained only the usual reservations for canal rights of way, reciting the fact that the state received title "with power to convey the same in fee simple."

Carey act entrymen who have been uncertain as to the character of their title will be relieved of all apprehension in regard to the matter and may proceed with the development of minerals in many of these tracts, long withheld in the belief that the mineral was reserved to the government and that its discovery would prevent title passing.

## 20 YEARS' WAGES PAID BY A DEED TO FINE RANCH

PLAINTIFF ASKS DEED TO LAND OR \$12,133; PAYMENT SINCE 1892 WANTED.

RENO, July 10.—O. C. Ross, pioneer rancher of Sparks and Red Rock, was the principal witness in Judge Moran's division of the district court today in the case of William R. Cool against E. Guy Clark as administrator of the A. J. Clark estate. Cool is suing the heirs of A. J. Clark for twenty years' wages as manager of a ranch near Sparks, now known as the Cool ranch. Cool alleges in his complaint he was given the ranch property in question in 1912, some time prior to A. J. Clark's death, as payment for many years of service. He and his family lived on the place and he is asking \$50 a month for over twenty years. He made a demand on the executor, E. Guy Clark, for a deed to the ranch, formerly known as the Baker property, as he claims was promised him by Clark, or for payment of \$12,133, and says the executor refused to respect the promise alleged to have been made by his father. The Clark estate is valued at \$200,000 and an order for its distribution has been asked, with the exception of a comparatively small amount to take care of debts and expenses.

Cool says he worked for A. J. Clark on the ranch from May 1, 1892, until July 30, 1912. Since he was given the ranch by Clark he asserts he has paid \$725 for permanent improvements.

### TO DIE NEAR OLD HOME MILLIONAIRE'S PLAN

MAYSVILLE, Cal., July 10.—Capt. James Ewart, 75 years old, millionaire bachelor banker, left last night in a private car accompanied by doctors and nurses, to die at Mount Gilead, O., his boyhood home. Capt. Ewart has had a mausoleum erected in a cemetery at Mount Gilead at a cost of \$100,000. In the days of the James boys, Ewart made his banking house a veritable fortress, erecting barricades behind which men with rifles constantly were on guard.
