BONDED BARRELS FOR BOGUS BOOZE CAUSE SEIZURES

SALT LAKE DEALERS SWINDLED TO TUNE OF HUNDRED BARRELS MISBRANDED STUFF.

Special agents of the United States treasury department, working in conjunction with the internal revenue officers of the country, have unearthed widespread violations of the revenue laws governing the manufacture and sale of whisky, says the Deseret News. Nearly 100 barrels of misbranded whisky have been found in the Salt Lake district, the spurious product having all the brands and stamps of the legitimate article.

D. E. Evans, chief deputy collector, said the whisky had been detected and seized at different points over the entire country by special agents of the treasury department, on commission from Washington, and not by the local revenue men. The operations of whisky adulterators are not confined to this district, according to Mr. Evans, but have extended all over the country for many years.

For weeks special agents of the department have been securing the country for manufacturers who have been putting out the illicit product. The whisky is made in such a manner that the ordinary tests do not disclose its spuriousness, and only the chemical tests to which samples have been submitted at the department laboratory at Washington have shown the whisky to be adulterated.

It is stated that whisky jobbing houses in the middle west and east, notably in Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City and Cincinnati, are directly guilty of the whisky frauds, though the government may not be able to punish them. Salt Lake liquor dealers say that under the laws, as they now exist, saloonkeepers may resort to the recovery of money they paid jobbers for apparently genuine whisky in the civil courts.

Specific violations in the latest whisky frauds, say saloon men, consist in the refilling of whisky barrels bearing the proper stamps and supposed to contain what the liquor trade calls "double stamp" whisky, with cologne spirits, young whisky and other ingredients. This concoction, say Salt Lake saloon men, is worth less than 40 cents per gallon, though it has been sold to them at the price of good bonded whisky.

Federal officials attached to the internal revenue service believe, on the other hand, that the offenders may be found guilty on a charge of general conspiracy on the grounds that the whisky was sold to saloon men under the pretense of being the original whisky, contained in the barrels as indicated by the stamps and other marks, and that the saloonkeepers believed that they were buying a genuine article.

Under the internal revenue laws, double stamped whisky barrels must contain no whisky other than that which was actually in them when they were released from the government warehouses at the distilleries. Whenever a government officer finds these barrels to contain whisky other than that which should be in them, then the man in whose possession the barrels are at the time of discovery, becomes liable to the government for the tax on whisky and the cost of material used in preparing the contents of the barrel. Under this law the saloonkeepers may be compelled to give up thousands of dollars, though they appear to have been duped themselves.

THROWN FROM HORSE AND HAS NECK BROKEN

Word comes from Wells that the fifteen-year-old son of Thomas Yowell was thrown from a horse Thursday and instantly killed, his neck being broken. He and another boy were riding a horse, and in crossing the railroad tracks the horse stumbled, throwing both boys, breaking Vernon Yowell's neck and breaking the arm of the other boy.
