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AMERICAN STAFF OFFICER FORECASTS MILITARY MOVEMENTS IN EUROPE

WASHINGTON, August 10.—American military men are now interested in the mobilization aspects of the European situation. In the archives of the general staff of the army war college are confidential reports as to the plans of the European armies for mobilization, the time required for putting each army on a war footing, and similar information. With the critical eyes of experts, American officers will now watch to see the extent to which these mobilizations succeed or fall short of carefully worked out plans.

The German army, he said, "is widely distributed, and for this reason it requires longer to mobilize it than to assemble the army of a compact nation like Germany, with a wonderfully well organized military machine. The bulk of the army of Russia in Europe is west of a line drawn north and south through Moscow. It would not require long to mobilize that portion of the army west of Moscow, but if mobilization were to be complete and were to include the movement of troops from Asiatic Russia and eastern Russia toward the German or Austrian frontiers, it would require a long time."

German Army Compact. "The German army is not only compact, but it is generally recognized as the most advanced in the world in its detailed plans and preparation for assembly. The German army will probably be the first one mobilized. France is also a compact nation for military purposes. The French army can mobilize quickly. It is in better shape than it ever was before. France is now believed to be ready for any emergency. We have never been able to learn the French plans of mobilization. But there is no doubt that the French army can be mobilized in a very short time. I should say that the German army can be mobilized quickest, that France ranks next in ability to mobilize quickly, and that France can mobilize quicker than Austria, while it would require longer for Russia than any of these nations."

Every Man Knows Place. "Every man in the German fighting machine knows the place assigned to him and what he has to do a few hours after he enters the field." Officers of the general staff here assert that every officer is in possession of secret military orders that enables him to take his proper place on the gigantic military chessboard.
