GUNS PLAY HAVOC WITH BELGIANS ENTRENCHED AT BRUSSELS

Over One Million Ounces Silver Shipped On a Basis 58 1/2 Cents

ARTILLERY DUEL ENDS WITH A HAND TO HAND ENCOUNTER.

LONDON, August 19.—The German army in Belgium lying east of Brussels has taken the offensive in a battle which began yesterday afternoon, raged all night and still is going on today.

According to the dispatches the Germans opened the fighting east of Brussels with a brisk cannonade of the Belgian lines at two o'clock.

The Belgian lines were protected by an earthwork barricade and the German artillery began hurling shells against these works.

After a hard struggle, says the Central News correspondent, the Germans fell back. It was indicated that the Germans had massed in heavy forces east of Louvain, the headquarters of the Belgian army.

RAILROADS OPEN TO CITY OF MEXICO

HEAVY CANNONADING AT BRUSSELS

(By International News Service.) BRUSSELS, August 19.—The sound of heavy cannonading is getting nearer to Brussels. All signs point to a big battle between Belgians and Germans east and southeast of the capital.

PARIS, August 19.—Rumors have reached the war office that the Belgian army is retiring from Louvain and Brussels to Antwerp.

MONTENEGRINS MENACE RAGUSA

(By International News Service.) CETTINJE, Montenegro, via Rome and London, August 19.—King Nicholas has been notified by Austrian authorities if the Montenegrin army attacks Ragusa a number of prominent Servians and Montenegrins held there as hostages will be executed.

AVALANO, Albania, via Rome and London, August 19.—Muslim insurgents set fire to Berat on Monday. They have occupied Fieri and are marching on Avalona.

LONDON, August 19.—A communication from Paris says confirmation has been received of a Servian victory at Shabatz, Servia, over 80,000 Austrians. The estimated Austrian casualties are 3,000 killed and 5,000 wounded.

GERMANS RETREATING IN ALSACE

(By International News Service.) PARIS, August 19.—Occupation of Saarburg and Pfalsburg by French troops was announced today. The German troops which occupied these towns are reported to have fallen back toward Zabaren at the entrance to a pass through the Vosges mountains.

MAY SWING ITALY INTO LINE

AUSTRIAN SHIP TAKEN BY FRENCH

INSURANCE RISKS TO BE WRITTEN BY UNCLE SAM

GRAND TRUNK STEAMER ASHORE AT PRINCE RUPERT

SPEND MILLIONS TO BUY SHIPS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, August 19.—President Wilson has approved the plan to have the government buy ships to take American foodstuffs abroad. It is tentatively agreed that an appropriation of \$25,000,000 will be asked Congress to purchase ships.
