FOUR DAYS FEROCIOUS FIGHTING DESCRIBED BY BRITISH SURVIVOR

(By International News Service.)

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Wounded soldiers, returning home to recuperate, are telling amazing stories of the fighting in France. One of them who arrived at Waterloo station today said:

"We lay in our trenches and waited. At the break of day, after sleeping with our rifles beside us, a shell fired from a battery of German field artillery fell short of our position and burst with a terrific explosion some distance from our lines.

"Overhead we heard the hum of a motor, and soon we saw a German aeroplane whose occupants were doubtless signalling to the enemy's artillery how to find the right range. For the shells came nearer and nearer; the aim became better and better. The projectile fired from these guns makes a curiously weird shriek as it rushes through the air on its journey of destruction, and soon the shells were dropping right in our lines. Each one found its victims; they fell dead and mangled, and we were condemned to inactivity, for there was no enemy within reach of our weapons. So we waited and waited, and this is the hardest test of courage.

"Fully an hour passed, and still we were being shelled by the enemy's artillery. Then, suddenly, the German infantry appeared and poured a succession of volleys into our lines. They came in close formation, their gray uniforms scarcely visible until comparatively near to us. Our machine guns came into action, and we could see the havoc they worked. The German ranks were literally mown down, but on they came, always in increasing numbers, apparently regardless of the loss of life inflicted on them.

"Nearer and nearer they came, until, abandoning our trench, we fixed bayonets and charged them. After the strain of being human targets so long, what a relief it was to be dashing at them! They stood their ground until we reached them, pouring a hail of bullets into our ranks, which were terribly thinned. But our blood was up and they slaughtered them at close quarters.

"The 300 dwindled to 100 and that 100 became 50, and then our task was done, and we beat a retreat to avoid being cut off. As we went, still under a deadly fire, the ambulances came up to collect the wounded, and the Germans fired on them, just because they were English I suppose."

"Another body of our troops were badly harassed by some Germans concealed in a wood. We were ordered to set fire to the trees, which were quite dry owing to the long spell of hot weather. We did so, and soon the whole wood was ablaze. As the flames spread the Germans, who only

numbered a score or so, were obliged to run. We shot them all down.

Another: "I saw a shell burst right among our men. Eleven were killed and eighteen wounded. Three others who were in the middle of that detachment escaped without a scratch. The fortune of war."

The science of warfare: "Just behind our front firing lines the field telephone had been laid by the engineers. An officer lay on the ground describing to the headquarters staff the progress of the action around us. Though full twenty miles away, our general was thus informed by word of mouth exactly how things were going with us. His orders were transmitted in the same way and passed on to our commanding officer. Suddenly the officer at the telephone lay still and quiet. A German bullet had struck him and he was dead."

Artillery is not always effective. Our company was under the fire of the enemy's field batteries for fully two hours. The shells pitched before and behind us and there were many narrow escapes, but not a single man of us was injured."

A French soldier said: "Between Maubeuge and Charleroi I found a heap of eighteen German corpses. A few feet away I found eighteen French corpses. The coincidence was so strange that I laughed. War has a curious effect on the feelings."
