PRESIDENT BEGS ARIZONA NOT TO ASSEMBLE MILITIA

GRAVE INTERNATIONAL COMPLICATIONS MAY ENSUE, EXPLAINS WAR SECRETARY.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—After an extended conference with the president Secretary Garrison today requested Governor Hunt of Arizona not to send militia to the Mexican border because such an act might precipitate "grave international complications."

The government officials admitted today the situation on the border is the gravest the United States has faced since the occupation of Vera Cruz.

Governor Hunt telegraphed Secretary of War Garrison that he intended to send all available Arizona militia to Naco for the protection of citizens. Garrison replied that United States troops already there were doing everything possible to prevent injuries to life and property on this side of the border short of declaring war on Mexico.

General Bliss, commanding the American troops along the border, reported to the war department today that the constitutionalist garrison at Naco numbers 2,500 and they were outnumbered by the attacking force.

Neither side, Bliss added, was strong enough to attack.

MEXICAN TRAMWAY TAKEN BY ARMY DURING A STRIKE

CARRANZA SEIZES SYSTEM TO CONTINUE MOVEMENT OF TRAFFIC.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 14.—Seizure of the Mexican Tramway company's lines by the Carranza government was made at the point of the bayonet.

The government explained the measure as a provisional one, in the interest of the public, due to interference with street car traffic owing to a strike of carmen.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Fighting between Russians and Kurds has begun on the border of Persia, according to a News Agency dispatch from Constantinople.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—An Ostend dispatch says: "More than 600 Germans were killed and many wounded in engagements near Quatrecht and Melle Sunday. The French took 400 prisoners. The battle began in the neighborhood of Lyde."

PARIS, Oct. 14.—A dispatch from Nancy states that a German aviator dropped three bombs over that city yesterday. All exploded near the railroad station, injuring three persons and causing heavy damage.
