EPISCOPAL PASTOR ACCEPTS A CALL TO COALINGA

REV. F. R. SANFORD, OF ST. MARK'S CHURCH, RETIRES FROM THIS FIELD.

Rev. F. R. Sanford, of St. Mark's Episcopal church, with residence in Tonopah, who also serves the mission church of Goldfield, has announced his intention of accepting a call to Coalinga, Cal., and will leave for his new field the first of the week.

Rev. Mr. Sanford will take charge of Coalinga on All Saints' day, the first of November. The mission he assumes was started by Bishop Graves, of Kearney, Neb., retired, who went to Coalinga for his health and built up a parish of forty families.

FIRST MINISTER OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH RESIGNS

REV. J. M. SWANDER DECIDES TO ACCEPT THE PASTORATE OF ELKO CHURCH.

Rev. J. M. Swander, pastor of the Presbyterian church and the first Protestant minister to come to the southern country, has accepted the tender of the church at Elko and will leave for his new place of residence in a few weeks.

Mr. Swander came originally from Minnesota to Los Angeles and then was transferred to Rhyolite during the Bullfrog boom. Then he filled a pastorate at Las Vegas before coming to Tonopah three years ago.

KING ALBERT'S ARMY RECUPERATING IN FRANCE

BORDEAUX, Oct. 17.—The Belgian army under King Albert has escaped into France, where it is recuperating and will soon take the offensive against the Germans.

German Troops Occupy Ostend With Dunkirk for the Objective

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The Germans as predicted, occupied Ostend, on the Belgian coast, near where the German right and the allies were left struggling in the latest phase of what once was the battle of Ypres.

QUET EXISTING ALONG FRONT OF ALLIED FORCES

NO IMPORTANT CHANGES, BUT SLIGHT GAINS IN REGION OF ARRAS.

PARIS, Oct. 17.—The following official statement was issued this afternoon: "In Belgium the German troops occupying western Belgium have not passed a line drawn from Ostend, Thouron, Roulois and Menin.

In Russia no notable change has occurred in the situation on the East Prussian front. Along the course of the middle Vistula the Austro-German armies have been reduced to take the defensive along the whole front.

BROKEN RIB DUE TO RUNAWAY AUTO

SLAYS CELLMATE AND BREAKS JAIL

LIFE TERMER COMMITS DESPERATE CRIME WITHIN PRISON AND ESCAPES.

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 17.—Search continued today for Frank Creeks, serving a life sentence in Folsom prison for murder, who last night shot and killed his cellmate, George Phelps and Night Captain J. B. Dreyer, and escaped. Bloodhounds are being used by posses on both sides of the river. A battle is expected when the escaped convict is located, as he faces hanging for assault and murder.

VERDICT OF THE JURY IN DEATH OF JAMES D. PARSONS

The coroner's jury in the case of the late James D. Parsons reached a verdict yesterday afternoon that death was due to a gunshot wound self-inflicted. In the testimony it developed that at least one paid-up policy for \$5,000 was carried on the life of the deceased.

RETREAT FROM ANTWERP WAS A ROUT GIGANTIC BATTLE STAGED IN AUSTRIA ONLY 100 MILES FROM LONDON

BERLIN, Oct. 17.—Preparations are under way for a gigantic battle at Casten Aerna, where the Austrians and Germans have taken positions along the Vistula and San, ready for eventualities.

FAMINE SEIZES BELGIUM AND FRANCE IN CLUTCHES

TENS OF THOUSANDS REFUGEES BEGGING FOR RELIEF FROM GAUNT HUNGER.

CALAIS, France, Oct. 17.—The pallor of terror and desolation hangs over northern Belgium and France. Tens of thousands of refugees, penniless, homeless and hungry, have been taken to England where they are living on charity.

ALSACE IS STRONG FOR THE GERMANS IN PRESENT WAR

THE HAGUE, Oct. 17.—While German newspapers have studiously refrained from remarks concerning the attitude of the Alsacians toward the hostile camps in the western theater of war, a Swiss who followed the operations of the French and German troops in the Sandgau is quoted in the Cologne Gazette as saying:

"The French regularly, during an engagement, bombard the villages for hours, maintaining a terrific fire, tactics for which the Alsacians have come to dislike them extremely. It is remarkable, moreover, how German the Alsacians have become of a sudden. What 44 years failed to accomplish in this respect, a few hours of the European war have done."

"The Alsacian serving in the German army is doing his duty. With the spilling of blood came a fraternal feeling, best expressed, perhaps, in the saying: 'Our troops fought at such and such a place; lost or won at this or that point.' 'Our' troops, of course, are the Germans, because the Alsacians and Lorrainers have fought where the fighting was hottest, and now they are proud of the sacrifice in blood and life they have made."

BRITISH SHIP HELD ON SUSPICION OF HELPING ENEMY

CARGO SAID TO BE INTENDED FOR THE GERMAN CRUISER LEIPZIG.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 17.—C. White Mortimer, British vice consul here, filed a formal protest today with Collector of Customs Elliott against the granting of clearance to the British steamer Mazatlan, giving as his reason that the Mazatlan had taken aboard a large quantity of provisions for the German cruiser Leipzig, now off the Mexican coast.

CAREY ACT ORDER VACATED AND LAND OPEN TO ENTRY

RUSH OF HOMESTEADERS TO FISH LAKE VALLEY INCLUDES MANY WOMEN.

The Carey act appropriation that has tied up a large acreage of the choicest land in Fish Lake valley has been vacated through failure of the appropriators to carry out their declarations and turned back on the market for settlement by homesteaders.

FIVE MEN INJURED BY FIRING FROM MEXICAN SIDE

FOUR AMERICAN SOLDIERS WOUNDED WHILE PATROLLING THE BORDER.

NACO, Oct. 17.—Five men, a civilian and four American soldiers, were wounded by Mexican bullets which flew across the international boundary during an attack by Maytorsena on the troops of the Carranza garrison at Naco, Sonora. One soldier was shot in the temple while on duty, 400 yards from the boundary.

RIGHT OF SEARCH OF U. S. VESSELS EVOKES PROTEST

FRENCH CRUISER VIRTUALLY MAKES PRISONERS OF FIVE PASSENGERS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—A protest from the forcible search of the American merchant ship Morapan by the French cruiser Conde in the Caribbean sea, was filed in the senate by Senator Thomas. A letter submitted from R. W. Patterson, a Metapan passenger, asserted the Conde officers forced five Germans on the Metapan to sign parole agreements binding them not to fight against the allies.

Senator Thomas' statement caused Senator Stone, chairman of the foreign relations committee, to interrupt with a warning to belligerent nations to respect the rights of the United States as a neutral nation.

RAIN AND SNOW IMPEDE ADVANCE OF BOTH SIDES

RETREAT OF GERMANS MAY BE CUT OFF BY HEAVY PRECIPITATION.

PARIS, Oct. 17.—A steady rain to-night drenched the battlefields, adding to the discomfort of troops, and the difficulties of operations. With the resumption of fighting today interest has centered on the allies' left.

Russians Chased Into the Swamps Of Marmoras by Austrian Army

VIENNA, Oct. 17.—It is officially announced that fighting continued Thursday along the entire battle front from Stry and Zambor, southwest of Przemysl, to the mouth of the River San. In Marmoras Sziget, Hungary, the enemy has been pursued by Austrian detachments which occupied Pals in the valley of the Black Bistria. Russians are retiring. The Austrians followed to Zielona.
