TONOPAH MAN'S OBSERVATIONS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

RETURN OF G. C. PENROSE, FORMERLY SHIFT BOSS OF THE WEST END.

G. C. Penrose, who left Tonopah last April to look up placer mines in the Canadian northwest, returned a few days since, bringing with him a sample of gold taken from a large placer located in the Omineca mining district, B. C. Mr. Penrose was formerly shift boss of the West End. The sight of such gold is certainly good for "eyes." Consists of pieces ranging in size of flattened rice to nuggets worth over \$12 and carrying a gold value per ounce of \$17.50. The placer deposit consists of a heavy body of well rounded gravel approximating 25,000,000 cubic yards, situated in a beautiful section of country tributary to Prince Rupert on the line of the new Grand Trunk Pacific, the site on which was connected during last August, and over which line through trains are running from the Atlantic to the Pacific seaboard.

A heavily timbered section where such game as grouse, wild sheep and bear abound, and the Skuna river and creeks, where all kinds of fish may be caught. The railroad from tidewater follows the Skuna river into the interior for a distance of some 200 miles, and while this is through the wildest and roughest country imaginable, the railroad people boast of the best roadbed with reference to grades and curvature of any transcontinental line. Following the edge of the Skuna, which is a very large river, one almost stands spellbound in awe and admiration. Snow-capped mountains, rising almost perpendicular to great heights above timber line, down over which large streams of water flow from the glaciers above, form beautiful cataracts and where through the heavy timber evidence of the power of the snowslide may be seen, where every vestige of vegetation has been removed to the bare rock, and immense trees swept into the ocean by high water. Prince Rupert, the newest city on the Pacific coast, has a population of some 6,000 people, and lots for city building are sold to a distance of six miles. Here may be seen the evidence of what it sometimes costs to build cities in the west. Rupert has a sloping position overlooking a beautiful bay and is built practically on bedrock, which was covered with timber and a particular detested conglomeration of vegetation called muskeg. As is the rule in most city building, not too much care is exercised in the first building, so here may be seen along the business streets, buildings standing as much as 35 feet above the street, which has been graded down to the proper level, through the hardest kind of formation. Excavation for a two million dollar hotel was completed, but owing to the effects from the war the building has been delayed for this year. The whole country has been seriously affected from the war, and all industries have been closed.

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ACCUSED BY GIRL TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

HEAD OF CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY SUICIDES AFTER GIRL IN CHARGE COMPLAINS.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 19.—Herbert W. Lewis, head of the Children's Home Aid society of California, committed suicide in Westlake park last evening by taking poison. He was arrested on a San Francisco warrant, the complainant being a 15-year-old girl in his charge. Lewis was 55 years old, a man of family and of more that state wide prominence in the work of rescuing waifs and reclaiming wayward girls. He had protested his innocence of the offense charged against him.
