**NYE COUNTY WINS IMPORTANT ACTION**

(Continued from Page 1)

was disqualified, decided all issues in favor of the First National and against the county, and the county appealed. The supreme court, in the decision just handed down, sustains Judge Orr in all of his rulings, with the exception that the supreme court holds that boards of county commissioners in Nevada have no power to issue promissory notes and make them negotiable, so that the transferee takes same as clear of any defenses the county may have as against original payee, and which defenses existed at the time the notes were assigned or before Nye county had notice of the assignment. Under the decision, it would seem that if Nye county had notice of the assignment of the notes to the First National, at any time before February 23, 1909, then the First National would be entitled to judgment; otherwise, judgment would go against it and in favor of Nye county, unless there are other defenses in favor of the bank against this claim of Nye county. The decision is a lengthy one and clears the way for further proceedings by disposing of a large number of legal contentions made by Nye county against the claim of the bank. The issues are now simplified and an early termination of the litigation should be in order. H. R. Cooke represented the First National bank and P. M. Bowler and Geo. B. Thatcher looked after the interests of the county.

**JACK BARTMESS IN A FORGIVING MOOD**

**PLEASED THAT STATE POLICEMAN SHOULD SPEAK WELL OF HIS FAMILY**

Jack Bartmess, who says that his name is misspelled almost as often as it appears in print, discussed his case before the grand jury, to which he has been bound by Judge Dunsenath on the charge of unlawfully killing cattle, as follows:  
"Mr. Edwards, the arresting officer, was sent out to this country and it was impressed upon him that he must make arrests. I do not know why he picked on me, unless it may have been that he was talking with some of my enemies. So far as his insinuating that I have no friends in that section of the country, he is mistaken, as I am on speaking terms with nearly all the men, women and children in northeastern Nye county. One thing I am proud to say. Mr. Edwards said that I have one of the nicest families he ever met and one of the sweetest women he ever saw. I am very proud and thankful for that.  
"I am pleased to say that I have been splendidly treated by the officers of Tonopah as well as the people. I have met a good many friends here that I did not know I had. Furthermore, I have nothing to say against any one connected with the case in any way. So far as my being an aggressor, I want to say that someone took a half a hog out of my wagon the other night. I guess he was hungry and if he would have asked me I would have given him a whole hog, for I never refused anybody anything when I was in a position to give. As to my appearance before the grand jury, I have no fears of being fairly and impartially heard and given my freedom with my good name restored. I feel as though I am going back home to be received by my family, my friends and associates as I was before."

**OLD RESIDENT TO VIEW EXPOSITION**

**A. A. WAGER WILL TAKE TRIP TO COAST AND RETURN TO NYE**

One of the real pioneers of Nye county, a man who blazed trails and has walked over them for half a century, is A. A. Wager, a rancher of Hot Creek, who is spending a few days in Tonopah, the guest of Harry McNamara. Mr. Wager came to Nye county in 1869 and was one of the old timers of Belmont, when it was a booming mining camp, sharing with lone the metropolitan honors of the county. Mr. Wager was at first engaged in mining and he had his ups and downs, as did all the men who pioneered the region. Finally he went back to the soil and since that time has been satisfied with the simple life. He will leave in about ten days to visit the exhibitions at San Diego and San Francisco, after which he will return to Hot Creek, where he reached his three score and ten and where he expects to spend the balance of his days.
