HALLECK EASILY COLDEST STATION IN NEVADA

Halleck, Elko county, proved to be the coldest weather observing station in Nevada during December, while Tecoma, usually so chilly, dropped to third place, with Elko pushing Halleck for first honors.

The usual reports of the weather bureau show that Tecoma and Halleck tied with a low record of 22 degrees below zero for the month, while Halleck recorded 26 degrees below

zero at the lowest. Elko, however, averaged 17 degrees above zero for the entire month. Tecoma recorded 23 degrees on an average and Halleck an average of 15 degrees.
