**DIVORCE BILL COMES BEFORE LEGISLATURE**

**MANY LABOR MEASURES IN CONSIDERATION AT CARSON CITY**

The Washoe county delegation has been successful in one of its missions, namely the introduction in the Nevada legislature of the six months' divorce law, similar to that which prevailed up to the session of 1913, which provided for only six months' residence. The bill, known as assembly No. 11, was introduced by Assemblyman Waits, and was immediately assigned to committee.

Senator Scanlan's semi-monthly pay day measure was promptly tabled, but another labor measure, providing for eight hours for women employed, introduced by Senator Arnold, passed the upper house with but three negative votes. A bill by Senator Kenney, requiring leasers to put up a bond for the securing of wages of miners, and other liabilities, was made special order of business. Senator Harrington's bill, regarding blacklisting of employes, passed the senate by a margin of four votes.

A bill, introduced by Steele, providing that injury to men working on the surface or in mines caused by explosions shall be deemed prima facie evidence of negligence, was referred to the labor committee. A bill by Assemblyman Preston to amend the charter of the city of Reno was referred to the Washoe county delegation. The act relating to nepotism, passed by the senate, was referred to the ways and means committee of the house. Assembly joint and concurrent resolution, referring to the investment of school funds in real estate in Nevada, was referred to the judiciary committee. Senate bill No. 14, by Scanlan, providing for expert assistance to linemen having less than three years' experience, when engaged on power poles and in underground manholes, was referred to the labor committee. A bill was introduced yesterday afternoon by Senator Carpenter to repeal the tax commission. Senator Buol offered two measures, one amending the present gambling statute and the other providing for pari-mutuals at race tracks and fair grounds.

**INYO REALIZES ITS HEAVY LOSS**

**TELLS HOW TONOPAH AND GOLD-FIELD MARKET MAY BE RESTORED**

The Bonanza has drawn attention in both its local and editorial columns to the loss of a valuable market both here and in Goldfield by the ranchers of Inyo county. Comment on this important subject is made by the Owens Valley Herald:

The lack of co-operation among the ranchers of Inyo county has cost them many thousands of dollars. It will cost them more thousands unless some intelligent and comprehensive plan for marketing the products of the ranches of the county is adopted. As set forth in last week's issue of the Herald the rich Nevada market, which at one time absorbed a large portion of the food stuffs grown here, has been practically lost. This market rightfully belongs to Inyo county. It was lost, not because the people of Tonopah and Goldfield prefer to buy elsewhere, but because growers here, on account of the lack of system and organization, were unable to supply them with the kind of products they wanted, and at the time they wanted them. It is claimed by Nevada dealers that goods sent from here are in most cases improperly packed and that individual growers have been extremely careless in filling orders. If the Nevada market is to be regained these faults must be overcome. They can only be overcome by co-operation. It is useless for one grower to attempt to establish a market for his products by careful handling and packing if his neighbor destroys the good impression made by carelessness and lack of system. Co-operative marketing is a new thing, it is not an experiment. It is now being successfully carried on in many parts of the country. There is hardly a community in the state of California of any importance but has some organized methods of handling its products. In these days of keen competition it has come to be recognized as the only intelligent and profitable method of marketing. So universally has this come to be recognized that a bill has been introduced in congress providing for a national marketing commission. A similar bill has been introduced in the legislature of this state providing for a state marketing commission.
